HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Dec. 5.—(AP)—Anell Hoffman says the movies are luring Max Baer from the cattle business career he favored after losing to Joe Louis in a New York ring last September.

Hoffman, the ex-champion's manager, interviewed actors' agents in Hollywood today.

"They're all after Baer for one thing or another," said Hoffman. "They want him to do some westerns down here. Then there is an offer for Max to go over to Paris in January to open the Cafe de Paris and make a picture in England."

Hoffman said Baer "did pretty well" in his only screen appearance, a role in "The Prizefighter and the Lady," released many months ago.

The Sugar Bowl contestants have finally been selected, Louisiana State and Texas Christian will meet at New Orleans on New Year's Day. Texas Christian was defeated once by Southern Methodist last week, but is rated as one of the most powerful teams in the southwest. They come to the coast this week to play Santa Clara, at Kassar stadium Saturday, which is the reason that St. Mary's and Oregon are to tangle on Sunday in the same stadium, Santa Clara having put their bid in first, much to the consternation of Portland.

Texas Christian is rated 2 to 1 favorite over Santa Clara, but if they don't win they will face the same sort of let-down that would occur to S. M. U. if they should drop their Texas A. and M. game Saturday—both the Rose Bowl and the Sugar Bowl would suffer in attendance.

The winner of the Sugar Bowl game, by the way, is awarded a solid silver bowl to hold for one year, and a replica as a permanent trophy. A New Orleans antique house donated the bowl, which was cast in England in 1830, bearing the hallmark of Enos and Barnard, silversmiths, in case you're interested in that sort of thing.

Stayton said, "poison alcohol deaths are now practically unknown, bootlegging diminished, and the states are receiving a large part of the revenue which, during national prohibition, went to support bootleggers and their associated criminals."

James M. Doran, administrator of the distilled spirits institute, contended repeal had "brought a definite improvement in the nation's revenue with a corresponding reduction in lawlessness."

Treasury statisticians said the public was consuming legal hard liquor at the rate of only 64 per cent of the pre-prohibition peak. No figures were available on use of "bootleg."

Doran's organization placed federal revenues from liquor taxes at \$199,065,824 for the year ending November 30, as compared with \$153,448,779 for the first repeal twelve-month.
