BUTTER WEAKENED BY OUTPUT INCREASE IN PORTLAND TERRITORY

PORTLAND, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Increased manufacture and receipts of butter were both suggested for the local territory with resulting weakness gathering in the undertone of the trade. There was no further price change for cubes on the produce exchange for the late season but in spots lower prices were suggested on the open market. Trade in the egg market remained weak but there was no further open market change for the day on the exchange. Receipts continued to reflect light gain. Still another rise of lip was shown on Oregon triplet cheese and a similar one for loaf on the exchange but this is not effective generally in the open market. Tillamook was unchanged and it established the market here. Demand for live chickens continued to reflect a strong tone. No changes were shown, but all sales meet with much flavor from killers. Even those talking lower prices are now offering the limit.
