STINER PLANNING DIZZIER OFFENSE FOR NEXT SEASON

Wide Open Play of Beavers Will Be More So in 1936 Says Grid Mentor — 18 Lettermen Will Return

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 11. — (AP) — Oregon State college's wide-open defense which thrilled spectators and chilled opponents this season, will be still dizzier in 1936 — and probably even more effective.

This was the word today of Head Coach Leon Stiner, who boldly said his team "should be even better" next year. But it will be no bed of roses for the Beavers, he believes, for most opponents will be stronger.

Keeps 18 Lettermen.

While 18 lettermen graduate, only three were regulars. Returning will be 18 lettermen — nearly two full teams. This year's starting backfield returns intact. Seven of the returning lettermen are backs and 11 linemen.

Coach Stiner said next year's line should be stronger, on the whole, despite the loss of Jolin and Schultz, regular ends, and McClure, regular guard. Needless to say, the backfield will be stronger. Sophomores carried nearly all the backfield burden this season, and the starting tackles were sophomores.

The Beaver reserves should be about the same, he said. However, observers believe that if this year's talented rookies come through as expected, the reserve will be stronger, for there will be more experienced juniors and seniors.

Gray Remaining.

Joe Gray, probably the most outstanding all-around sophomore half-back in the Coast conference this season, should attain new heights. His passing arm was the magic wand of the Beavers' aerial circus, and he scintillated at ball carrying. Seldom did he fail to twist loose at least once a game for a kick return of 50 yards or more. His change of pace and ability to remain on his feet carried him farther than many speedier backs.

He tied with Chesire of U. C. L. A. for conference scoring honors at 48 points. (Chesire has one more chance Saturday against St. Mary's.) To his other accomplishments Gray added signal calling late this season, and showed capable generalship.

If Kolberg, sophomore fullback, and the other fullback candidates continue to improve, they will provide the line-smashing thrust needed to make Gray more effective on offense and end runs.

Plenty of Wingmen.

Anticipating the loss of both regular ends, the Oregon State coaches paid particular attention to developing reserves and freshmen. There will be plenty of racy, pass-catching wingmen on hand next fall.

Besides Gray and Kolberg, Swanson and Duncan are returning backfield regulars. The key linemen for next year are Daming, outstanding center; Strack, guard, and Miller and Fisher, tackles.

This was the first season of wide-open football for the Beavers, and they were handicapped by not having a strong enough power attack to supplement it. Nevertheless, the open football worked much of the time and produced thrills aplenty.

"We'll go right on next season, playing the same open, chance-taking football we did this, only still more so now that the players have the idea," Coach Stiner promised spectators and warned opponents.

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MARINE TO MEET WILDMAN HOLLIS ON MONDAY CARD

With the remark that "good things come in bunches," Promoter Mack Lillard today announced a wrestling card for next week which he thinks will be equal to the one held Monday. The Monday bouts were generally conceded the best ever held here.

Two weeks ago there was a young riot at the Army, with the fans stepping into the fray and attempting to massacre Ken Hollis, the wild eyed Oklahoman who had just beat Les Wolfe into submission. It took a flying squadron of police to quiet the riot, and the boxing commission ruled thumbs down on Hollis' ever appearing here.

During that hectic skirmish with Wolfe, Bob Kennaston, as referee, was felled by a terrific blow on the back of the head from Hollis, knocking him as cold as last week's dumpings. By the time he had come to, the riot was over, and Hollis was streaking for his dressing room. Kennaston chased him, but was too late to do anything about it then, so begged the commission for a chance to meet the wild man in the ring, no holds barred with no referee to hinder the slaughter.

The boxing commission was adamant, however, in their refusal to let Hollis appear again, but yesterday ruled that he could meet Kennaston after that young man had put up an impassioned plea. He did refuse to let the two men mix without the soothing influence of the referee, and also refused to sanction the no-holds-barred idea, ruling that the strangling had to be outlawed.

Arrangements for the match were completed last night, and it will be the main event on a three star card. The match featuring Shinokuni "Killer" Shikuma, huge Japanese black-belt champion in a jiu jitsu match, had already been arranged for the main event, but will be stepped down into semi-windup position. Lillard said, the "Killers" opponent to be Les Wolfe, who believes he has a flair for the Japanese type mayhem. Wolfe has never wrestled jiu-jitsu, but has watched many such matches and is confident he can trim the big Japanese.

In the opening bout, Rex Moberly, who lost to Frankie Peck here Monday, will again meet the San Francisco in the curtain raiser. After liking to Peck last week Moberly was particularly depondent, believing himself to be a better man than the rugged, globe trotting Peck, and limping Lillard for a rematch which was finally granted. Lillard announced today that the attendance should surpass last week's record, but stated that there would be no raise in prices.

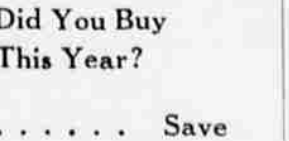

Louis, before a packed gymnasium at his Pompton Lakes, N. J., training quarters, pummeled four sparring

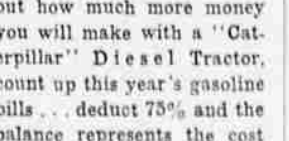

It was also brought to the attention of citizens that all the money raised through the local seal sale is used in Oregon with the exception of 5 percent, which is sent to aid in financing the national organization.

In 1934, tuberculosis killed 357 persons in Oregon, in comparison to the 311 killed by automobiles, according to a report made by the Oregon Tuberculosis association, which also stated that most of these deaths were preventable.

Mrs. Alex Sparrow, chairman of the local committee in charge of the seal sale, stated that the educational message of the Christmas seal must be sent into many more homes, schools and factories during the next year if control of tuberculosis is to continue to be effective.

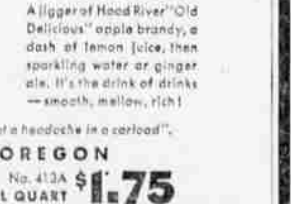
