PORTLAND AIRPORT NEED RECOGNIZED

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 13.—(Sp.)—The city council, the dock commission and the port of Portland agreed today that steps should be taken to acquire a super-airport here, and then fell to wondering how to go about it.

They agreed a larger airport should be built because the Swan Island airport here is considered too small and poorly situated for about 40 passenger planes which United Air Lines announced would be obtained soon.

None of those at the meeting could say just how much a super-airport would cost or the exact procedure to be followed in obtaining a site. Later meetings of the groups were called.

TRANS-ATLANTIC PLANES PLANNED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Plans to begin a regular scheduled trans-Atlantic air service between New York and England by the summer of 1936 were announced today by R. Walton Moore, assistant secretary of state, at the close of conferences with British, Irish and Canadian government officials.

Moore's statement said the regularly scheduled service will involve four round trips a week.

It will be operated by the Pan-American Airways, an American concern, and the British Imperial Airways Limited, using two routes, the northern airway via Canada, Newfoundland and the Irish Free State and the southern via Bermuda to Puerto Rico.
