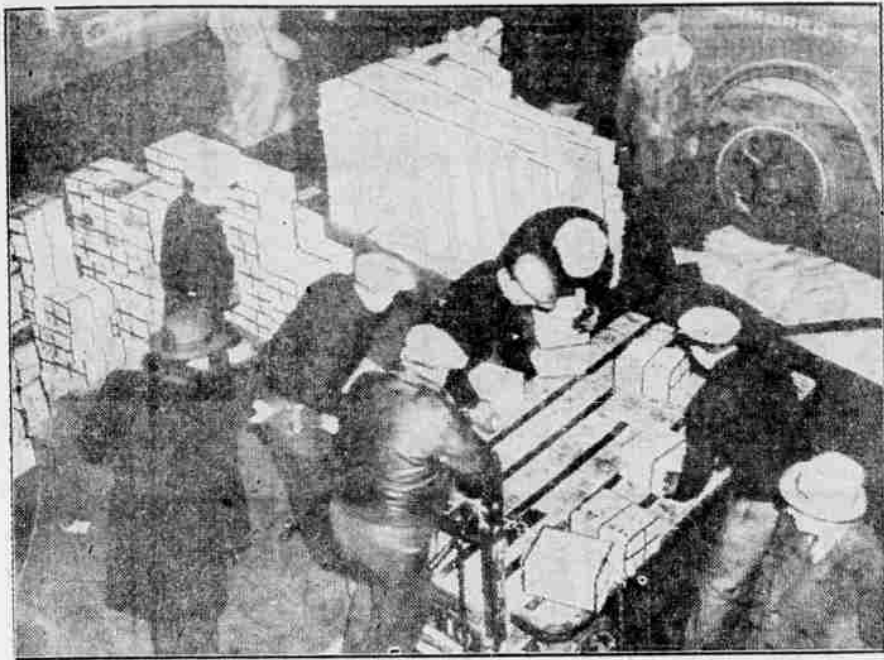


FRANCE SENDS MILLIONS IN GOLD TO NEW YORK

ITALIAN BATTERY READY FOR ACTION IN AFRICA



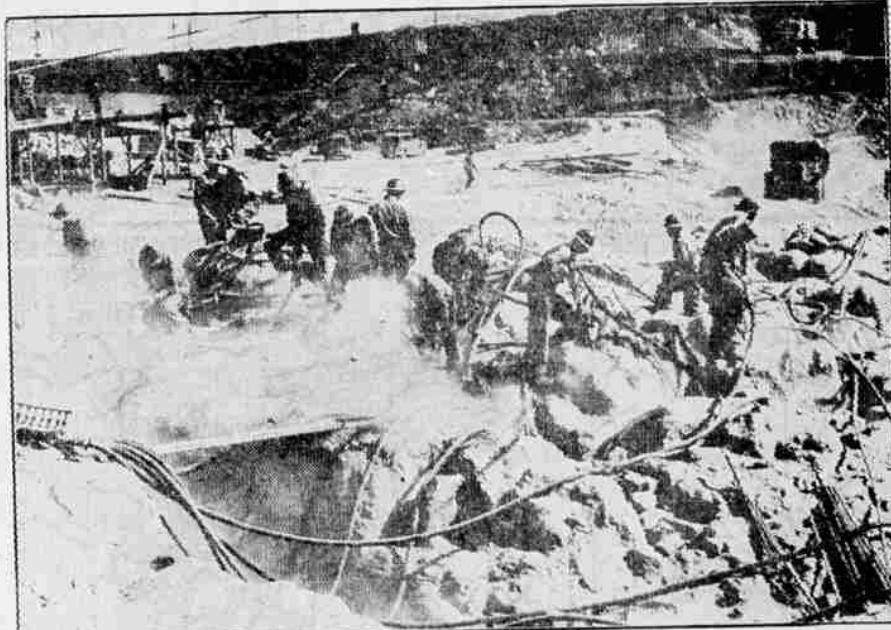

REVOLUTION QUELLED BY BRAZILIAN SOLDIERS



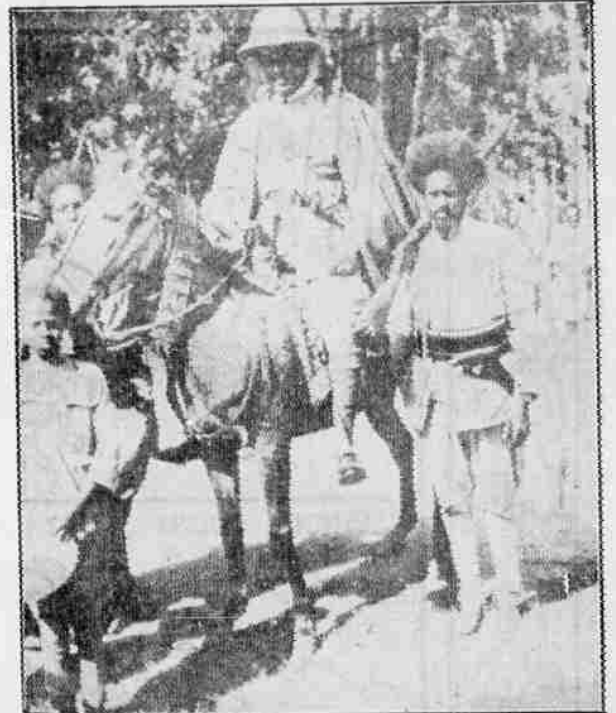

ALL DRESSED UP - IN GOLF SOCKS



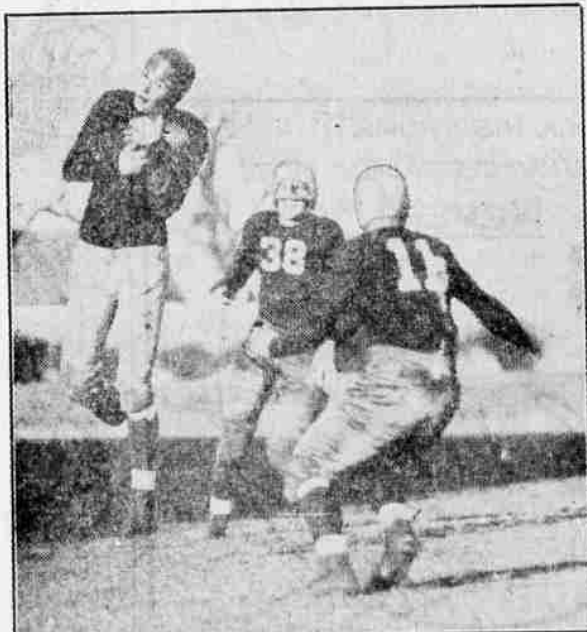

OREGON STATE END SNAGS PASS



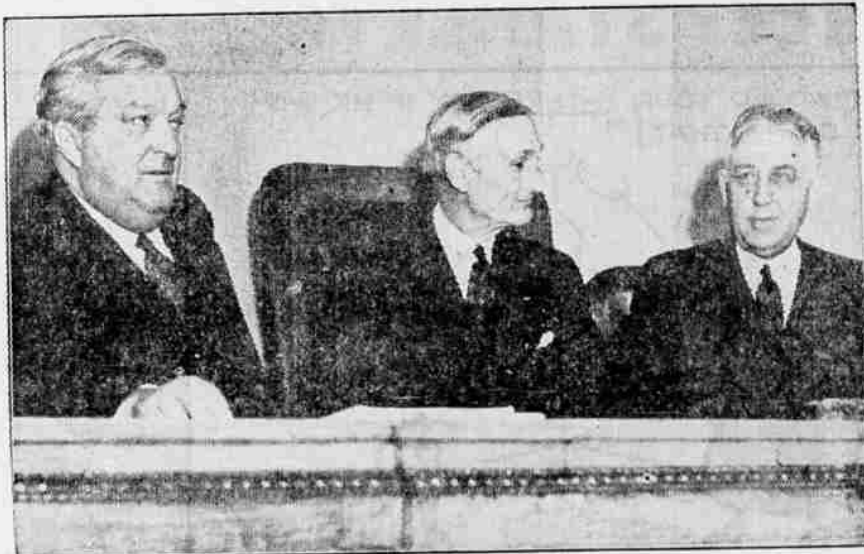

BROKERAGE FIRM PROBE ORDERED

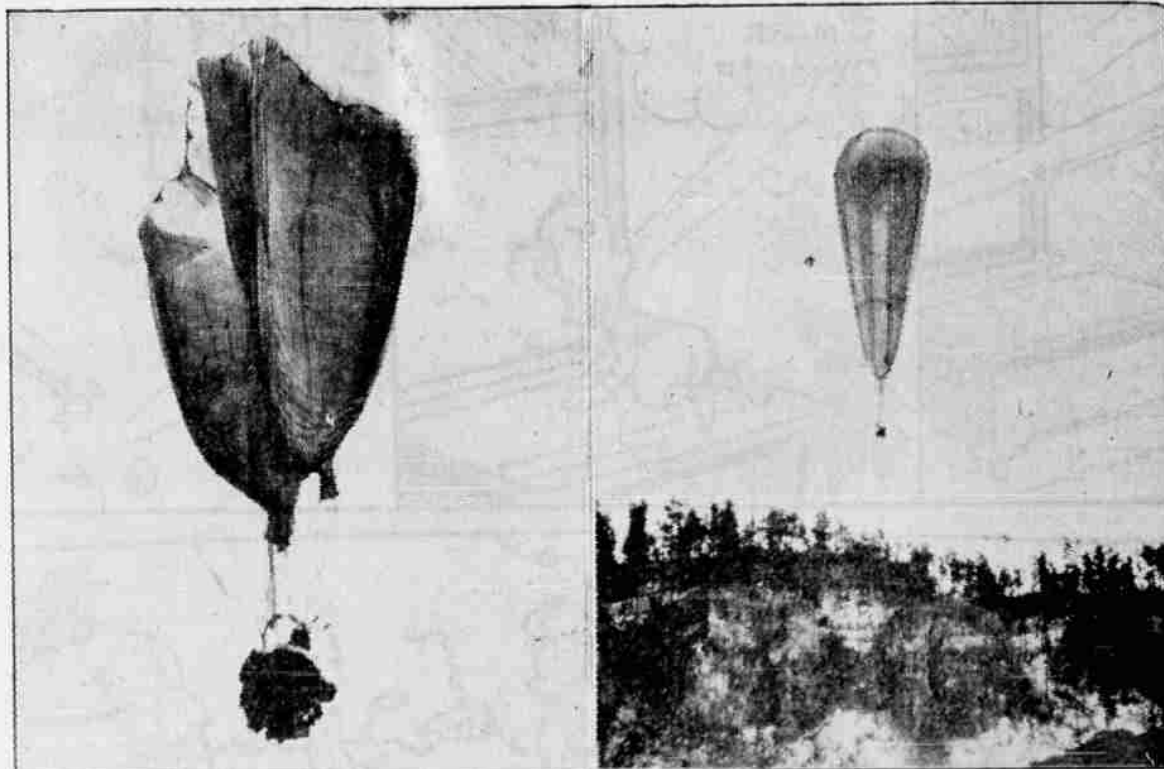
