

# Mail Tribune Southern Oregon All-Star Football Squads Selected

## 5 TIGERS, WITH 2 EACH FROM OTHER SCHOOLS PICKED

### Coaches And Officials Do Judging — Seven Points Considered — Ashland Star Given Quarter Post.

The annual Mail Tribune selections for the southern Oregon All-Star high school football teams have just been completed, with five of the Medford championship squad on the first team, and each other team in the circuit placing two men.

On the second squad Medford placed four, Ashland placed three, and Grants Pass and Klamath Falls each placed two. Selections were made for the following seven points: (1) leadership (2) blocking (3) tackling (4) versatility (5) offensive effort (6) defensive effort, and (7) good sportsmanship.

Coaches of the southern Oregon teams, officials who worked the games, and newspaper reports were consulted in the decisions. The All-Star cast follows:

## ST. MARY'S LOSES TO UCLANS 13-7, FAN SLUGS 'REF'

### Ragged Play By Gaels Gives Edge To Victors In Bitter Battle.

KEZAR STADIUM, San Francisco, Dec. 14.—(UP)—Standing off the challenge of a power-packed St. Mary's football team, University of California at Los Angeles closed its greatest season in history with an upset 13 to 7 victory today.

Bitterly fought from start to finish, the game ended in a wild flurry as an irate fan, angry with repeated penalties against the Gaels, accosted Referee Nibs Price and planted a right to the jaw. J. Blewett, field judge, rushed in and halted the battle.

Taking advantage of ragged play by the Moraes squad, the Bruins took the ball in the second quarter on the Gaels' 18-yard line. Charles Chesire, U. C. L. A. all-American halfback candidate, was spotted for a 10-yard loss. Two plays later left end Bob Schroeder shared a beautiful pass in the clear and stepped over the goal line for a gain of 26 yards and a touchdown. Chesire's try for the extra point was wide.

St. Mary's staged an 80-yard touchdown drive in the first five minutes of the third quarter with quarterback Lou Perry plunging over from the one-foot line to score. He also made good the kick for extra point.

A moment later and the Gaels were down to the Bruin 6-yard stripe. Fullback Floyd Maxham started over for a goal, but fumbled to lose the ball and give the Bruins first down on their own 30.

From that point the U. C. L. A. team, co-holder with Stanford and California of the Pacific coast conference championship, moved out to the Gaels 42-yard line before the quarter ended, taking the ball after an exchange of kicks. Chesire started from his own 46 and rammed 28 yards in a sparkling run that saw him swiveling past a futile company of tacklers.

Substitute quarterback Bob Williams faded back on a delayed kick, dropped in behind a charging line of interferences and swept clean around the left side of the St. Mary's line for a 12-yard run and touchdown. He kicked the extra point.

The Stanford squad is at full strength with the exception of Jim "Monk" Moscrip, famous goal kicking end, who injured a knee in the game with California. Dr. Fritz Roth, team physician, said Moscrip might not be in condition to play against Southern Methodist.

## SNOWMEN FROLIC CRATER PK. TODAY

Rogue Snowmen and their guests will spend today at Crater Lake national park, skiing, snowshoeing, tobogganing, sleighing and otherwise sporting themselves in keeping with their descriptive name.

Final plans for the outing were made at a meeting in the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce on Friday night at which time Glen Patrick, president, announced the annual election of officers would be held at the lake today between three and four o'clock in a building provided for their use by the park service.

Weather at the resort yesterday was reported clear and bright, with the snow crusty enough for good winter sports. Highways were open but motorists are advised to carry chains in case of emergency.

David H. Canfield, park superintendent, returned from the lake last evening and stated that weather reports indicated ideal conditions for the Snowmen's outing.

## PITT DOWNS TROY 12 TO 7 MARGIN

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, Dec. 14.—(UP)—The University of Pittsburgh drove over two touchdowns and presented a stalwart defense in the pinches to score a 12 to 7 victory over University of Southern California in an intercollegiate clash here today.

Approximately 45,000 fans saw Pitt even up the series with U. S. C. The win by the eastern club gave each university two victories.

Pitt's touchdowns came in the first and third periods. Frank Patrick, sophomore fullback, drove for a scant foot for the first tally. The second came after Pitt advanced the ball 81 yards, with Homer Handour, senior halfback, doing most of the work. He contributed two runs of 25 and 24 yards, respectively, during the march. His touchdown slash was good for seven yards. Patrick missed two place kicks after the touchdowns.

The Trojan touchdown was a spectacular last-minute affair. U. S. C. won the Pitt 39 yard line after a punt when Davy Davis shot a 20-yard pass to William Galsford, end. Galsford gathered in the ball and loped 19 yards through the Pitt secondary for the score. Sutherland converted a place kick.

## BANK SUES SEALS FOR STADIUM LOAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 14.—(AP)—The San Francisco Bank filed suit in superior court against the San Francisco Baseball club and its officers today to collect \$300,000 on a promissory note.

The note, signed December 24, 1930, was negotiated for construction of Seals' stadium, completed in 1934 at a cost of \$750,000.

The complaint alleges that the baseball club agreed to pay all taxes on the stadium, but that during the fiscal year 1932-1933 the bank had to pay taxes approximating \$7,000.

Parker S. Mandus, president of the bank, said the suit was filed "to satisfy legal requirements."

## MEDIC TO ATTEND GRAPPLING MATCH TO GIVE FIRST AID

A doctor will be in readiness at the Armory tomorrow night when Ken Hollis, meaneast of all mean wrestlers ever to perform here, and Marine Bob Kennaston of Gold Hill tangle in a grudge match hailed as the wildest bout ever scheduled in the city.

Barred, no hold but the strangle barred, kicking and slugging and other arts usually associated only with logging camp societies will be permissible, and Promoter Mack Lillard has deemed it advisable to have a medical man in attendance in case of serious injury, he announced last night.

Lillard has already announced that there will be officers in attendance on the grapplers, and no out-of-the-ring scuffling will be tolerated. The wrestlers will be led directly to their posts, and after each bout they will be led back to their dressing rooms to prevent a recurrence of the riot which broke out two weeks ago when Hollis ran amok.

In the middle event "Killer" Shikuma, giant Japanese Jiu Jitsu expert, will meet the limber legged Texan, Les Wolfe, for two out of three falls. A flip of a coin will decide whether Jiu or catch-as-catch-can will be used for the first fall, with the next fall to be in the opposite manner. The man taking his fall (if there are two) in the shortest time, is to have the choice as to which style will be used in the final frame.

An unusual thing about Jiu Jitsu wrestling is the fact that pinning a man's shoulders to the mat does not constitute a fall, even though the shoulders might be pinned there half the night. The only way to get a fall in Jiu is to render the opponent unconscious or make him pat the mat.

The opening bout, under the Australian system, will feature Rex Mobley, Alabama strong arm expert, against Frankie Peck. In another grudge battle, Last week Peck won a close match over Mobley, and the Alabama pride has demanded a return bout, promising to win handily. There will be no raise in prices, Lillard has announced.

## LOUIS HAILED AS SECOND DEMPSEY LACKS REAL TEST

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Joe Louis, the new toast of Harlem, was being hailed as a second Jack Dempsey along Broadway today by almost everybody except the old Manassa Mauler himself.

Still the idol of fight fans, Jack stopped pumping hands in his Eighth avenue restaurant long enough to give an authoritative lowdown on the Brown Bomber, whose fists are making ring history every time he climbs through the ropes.

Dempsey freely admits Louis is the outstanding heavyweight prospect in years, but he goes a bit slow on the super-man stuff.

"We're not going to know if Louis is really great until we throw him in the ring with somebody who will do a little fighting himself," he said. Jack didn't hesitate a minute when asked whether Max Schmeling or James J. Braddock has the best chance of trimming Louis.

"Braddock unquestionably," he said. "I'm not telling you Braddock could lick Joe, but he has a better chance than Schmeling."

## ONE LOUIS PUNCH FINISHES BASQUE

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—(AP)—They imported old Senior Paulino Uscudun from San Sebastian, Spain, to find out just how hard Joe Louis can hit. And how the colored boy showed 'em. He fiddled around for three rounds in Madison Square Garden last night, then knocked the once redoubtable Spaniard flatter than the celebrated panesque with a paralyzing right that drove one of Paulino's teeth through his upper lip.

Her Max Schmeling, sitting way back in row G, felt the blow and winced.

The starting Louis scored a technical knockout over Paulino after 2 minutes and 32 seconds of the fourth round had elapsed. It was his 22nd knockout in his 26 professional fights. The right which floored the wood-chopper was the only Sunday punch Louis landed in the abbreviated contest. Prior to this the negro had been content with jabbing Paulino about the head with his left and occasionally directing a short right toward the Basque's somewhat paunchy midriff.

Before the first round ended Paulino's face was red from the peppering of Louis left-hand pokes.

Louis collected 40 per cent, or \$38,800, and brought his earning in the year he has fought professionally to around the \$400,000 mark.
