

GRUDGE MATCH ON TONIGHT'S MAT CARD

MEANIES TO MIX AS AFTERMATH OF RIOTOUS EVENING

Jiu Jitsu Exponent Will Tangle With Wolfe In Middle Match—Mobley And Peck Open Program.

It will be slug and kick at the Army tonight, and the devil take the hindmost, when two bitter grudge feuds and a jiu jitsu wrestling match take the center of interest in what has been heralded as the most exciting wrestling card in months.

In the main event, the long anticipated clash between Ken Hollis, the Oklahoma fire eater who several weeks ago was the recipient of a charming shower of blackjacks, at which the police were hosts, settles his differences with Bob Kennaston, Gold Hill Marine who doesn't like Hollis.

As a matter of fact, no one apparently likes Hollis, but Kennaston has a particular grievance against him because the Oklahoman slugged the Marine from behind as a climax to the Hollis-Wolfe match, which Kennaston refereed.

After that match, Kennaston offered to wrestle Hollis winner-take-all, or for money or chalk, just for a chance to show Hollis how a real rough and tumble fight was conducted. "I can hold my own with any man who ever lived in a rough and tumble fight," Kennaston said, and originally demanded that the bout be without the benefit of a third man in the ring, a concession the boxing commission was not willing to make. Hollis seemed completely uninterested in how the fight was arranged, and implied that he'd hand Kennaston the pasting of his career regardless of what rules were laid down. In past matches he has ignored rules completely anyway, so this detail was given little significance here today.

In the middle event "Killer" Shikuma, large Nipponese jiu jitsu expert, will meet Les Wolfe in the first jiu jitsu bout ever held in the city. A fair catch-as-catch-can grapple, Shikuma is rated the best jiu artist ever to wrestle outside of his native country, and is the only black-belt holder ever to appear in the United States.

May See More Jiu
How the fans will react to jiu jitsu is still a matter of conjecture. Promoter Mack Lillard stated today, adding that if the type finds popular favor there will be more such matches in the future. In jiu jitsu, the defeated man has to either be unconscious or must slip the mat in token of defeat, or the match goes on. Pinning of shoulders means nothing in the sport.

Opening the festivities will be the return bout of Rex Mobley and Frankie Peck, the two who put on a furious battle last week which finally went to Peck. Mobley took the first fall and was apparently well on his way to the second. Mobley is under the impression that Peck won on a fluke. Lillard stated, and the two have been matched again.

Although ticket sales are brisk, (there has been no raise in prices), Lillard said today that there were still seats available for the match, which may be a sell-out before the opening gong at 8:30.

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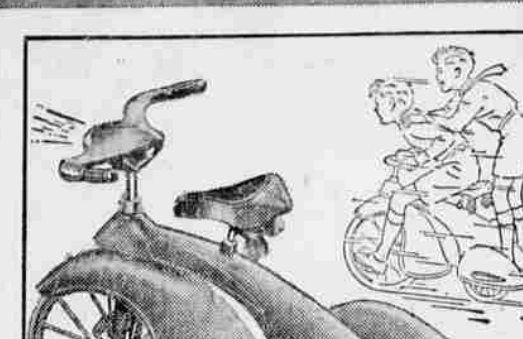


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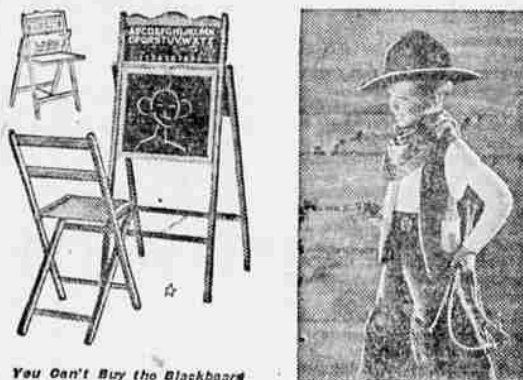
