With a howl of indignation, the almost-pure "amateur" enthusiasts are again frowning on the proposition that the paying of athletes be brought out into the open and a flat salary fixed, instead of the present system of paying athletes but keeping the transaction under cover.
How much more deplorable is the condition, now existing, whereby college students working their way through school by stoking furnaces are paid right out in the open. Is this the proper spirit? After all, even school buildings have to be heated, and it is a sad reflection on our American system of government when students have to be paid for their cooperation in this matter. If the right spirit prevailed, hundreds of eager freshmen would line up on matriculation day and volunteer their services to keep the steam up for dear old Whoozie.
In case anyone thinks that far-fetched, we'll explain why we think not. We'll take one of the stoker arguments—that athletes are amateur in spirit, and paying the participants takes the game out of the amateur class. All right, it is already out of that class, for every school on the west coast of any prominence—and plenty of those not prominent—pay their athletes now in some form or another.
It may consist of giving the student his board and room, his tuition and books, and his fees, but no actual cash. Or it may consist of actual cash, out of which he must pay these expenses himself. Or it may consist of giving him some dummy job, such as being a deputy sheriff or assistant fireman, with no duties other than turning in touchdowns on Saturday afternoon.
Is that wrong? The only thing wrong we can see about it is the fact that the whole thing has to be kept under cover. Is playing football for money capitalizing on something which should be offered free and gladly, and is football playing any easier a way to get through school than stoking the furnace? It is not. If two furnace stokers apply for one job, the braver one gets the call. Why? Simply because he can stoke the furnace better.
Shouldn't he be frowned upon for capitalizing on the fact that he has bigger biceps than the other man? He spends perhaps four hours a day in stoking the boiler, and has the rest of the time to himself, his expenses paid through school. A football player spends at least that much time in practicing each night, and at the end of the day is almost too tired to study, his body bruised, his mind exhausted.
But on Saturday the stoker has only four hours of work, as on any other day. The football player, on the other hand, has one hour of intense nervous and muscular excitement, which leaves him a physical wreck. He couldn't very well go back to the campus and devote another four hours to furnace firing, as the "amateur" bounds think he should, to have his hands clean.
And if he did fire furnaces on the side, he'd be knocking some worthy unable to play football, out of a job. They both have a right to go to college if they have something to offer in return for the money expended on them. The athlete shows a definite asset at the gate, the furnace man

doesn't, but each is entitled to what he earns, isn't he?
Then let the furnace fitters get their expenses, and the athletes get theirs. The building can be heated (among other things) by the gate receipts, and the college

can remain solvent because they are then stressing their scholastic superiority rather than their ability to pay more money for players. If each school is limited to \$100 per month per man, the student will go to the school he

thinks the most of. And the "amateurs" can lick their wounds in the content of a victory of some kind.
