## SAVICKEY RALLIES TO TAKE DECISION IN ELKS CLUB BOUT

Jess Savickey, 138, Medford district lightweight champion, took a hard-earned decision over Ralph Rodrigues, 138, Gasquet, in a spectacular fight on the CCG card at the Elks' temple Thursday evening.

Outpointed in the first round and knocked down in the second, Savickey rallied to another Rodrigues with punches in the final canto and win a popular decision.

Wild Man Simmons, 158, headquarters detachment, was knocked out in the second round by Ernest Mazurek, 163, Prescott, in the main event of the program. Simmons' wild swings proved entertaining but failed to make an impression on the tough boy from Rocky Ann.

Johnny Rosell, 118, Prescott, drew with Nat Lombardo, 117, Oregon Caves, in a battle that came close to stealing the show. The boys had met once before with Lombardo abiding Rosell for the decision. After being at it hammer and tongs for three rounds with neither holding an advantage.

## LOUIS-GASTANGA GO POSTPONED BECAUSE NEGRO OVERWORKED

HAVANA, Dec. 20. — (AP) — Still a trifle amazed at yesterday's quick postponement, Cuban boxing promoter, who associated with Mike Jacobs of New York in promoting the Joe Louis-Izidor Gastanga bout, prepared today to refund the money received on advance sales and start all over again, hoping the new date for the fight would stand.

Jacobs, who came here yesterday to investigate reports that "political conditions" might interfere with the holding of the bout on December 29, ending a day of wrangling by postponing the battle to February 2, and ordering the advance sale stopped.

The difficulty was not that trouble was expected but that Louis had "gone stale," Jacobs explained after being assured by government officials, including Jorge Echarte, secretary of state, that there was no danger of disturbances.

"Louis seems to have gone stale and needs a rest," Jacobs said. "His manager has cabled and telephoned to us, saying the boy positively can not fight December 29. He has had 15 fights in 11 months and his doctor has told him not to put on a glove for at least a month."

## FANDOM — AT — RANDOM

Last night a group of high school Sophomores, under Coach Bill Bowerman and Coach Ed Kirtley, ran up to Central Point and scrimmaged against the Central Point high school in a regular game, to give the Sophomores experience. This seems to us to be a splendid idea. The basketball prospects in the Senior high school aren't too promising this year, and if the Sophomores are neglected, won't be for years to come.

Bowerman stated yesterday that he is going to bring his Sophomores forward as rapidly as possible, using an all-Soph team alternately with his other in every game that he possibly can. Then next year, and the year after, and so on ad infinitum, he will have strong reserves coming up. The fact that almost the entire squad of last year is now gone illustrates the interesting thing is that two entire teams of Sophomores saw action, while several more promising lads sat on the bench, ready to go in if necessary. With other games in the offing with neighboring schools, those Sophs are going to be hunkered that will make itself felt in the years to come.

A new system is to be used at Medford this year. Bowerman said yesterday that he is not going to use "plays" in the common aspect of that term. "After the ball is in play there are too many situations arising to wreck any planned attack for any particular play. What we're going to do is to teach them each situation and how to cope with it, and then let them take care of themselves. I think we'll get a lot farther that way," Bowerman said.

The major change in basketball rules this year is going to produce a difference in the game. The system whereby a "feeder" is planted in the foul circle and shoots the ball out to a man slanting in from either side has been outlawed, and now no man on the offensive team can stand in his own foul ring more than three seconds, speeding up the game by forcing that man to drift in and out of the circle rapidly.

The "feeder" system was strongly relied upon by the great SONS team under Howard Hobson at the Normal school last year, and while it was used with deadly effect, it did slow up the game considerably. Incidentally, that play was the first one we ever saw in basketball that we could recognize as a play, consistently.

## PINE MILLS ENJOY BOOM IN BUSINESS

PORTLAND, Dec. 20. — (AP) — The Western Pine association announced today that 113 mills reported new business for the week ending December 14 was 80 per cent greater than the three-year weekly average for December.

The 51,153,000 feet represented a 17 per cent increase over new business of the week before.

Shipments were 41,793,000 feet and production 45,794,000 feet. The same mills for the corresponding week a year ago showed orders 40,139,000 feet and production 22,423,000 feet.

So far this year orders are 38 per cent above the corresponding period of last year.

## GAME CONSERVATION MEETING IS CALLED FOR FEB. 3 BY F. R.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. — (AP) — President Roosevelt announced today he was calling a North American wild life conference to meet here February 3 to 7, to work out a program for conservation of wild life resources.

The conference, announced at the President's regular press conference, will be designed to bring together all interested organizations, agencies and individuals in behalf of restoration of land, water and forest wild life resources.

A citizens' committee to be appointed by the president, under the leadership of F. A. Sillcox, chief forester, will direct the meeting.

Governors of state or persons designated to represent them will be invited. Each state will have a delegation twice as large as the number of senators and representatives in congress, making a total of 1062 in all.
