

DEVELOPMENT OF WILLAMETTE AREA HELD URGENT NEED

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 20. — (P) — A state planning board survey showed today that approximately 25,000 more families could be supported on farms in the Willamette valley if it is properly developed.

Without this development, the saturation point will come soon, since only about 2,000 more families could be comfortably supported and land takers are moving in at the rate of about 1,500 families a year, said the report which was compiled by A. S. Burrier, land specialist of Oregon State college.

The valley contains 13,000 square miles and has a population of about 600,000, whereas a European area of the same size supports 3,000,000 inhabitants.

The report recommended major steps in a developmental program. They were:

Classification of marginal land, and indication of type of development which will control erosion, conserve soil fertility. Classification would cost about \$170,000, it was estimated.

Provision for supplementary irrigation where possible.

Drainage for wet areas.

Land clearing where justified.

Flood control and development of rich bottom lands.

Subdivision of large holdings in certain areas.

Promotion of industries to provide work for the many part-time farmers.

"Some of these factors call for collective action by farmers and industrialists," the report said. "Some will proceed through individual effort, while others are dependent for action upon some public agency."

"Agriculture will be developed just as rapidly as each of the groups proceeds with its part of the general development."

OLD AGE PENSION HELD DEPENDENT UPON SALES TAX

works prior to the effective date of the act.

Personal property sold for use or consumption as an ingredient or component part in producing personal property for sale, or a material or chemical used in processing such new articles of personal property.

Isolated or occasional sales by one not in the business.

Gasoline Exempt

Motor vehicle fuels upon which a tax already has been imposed by the state.

Sales of personal property of each person to the extent of \$50.

The tax does not impose any tax on income from service as such, therefore, all salaries, wages and fees of all kinds would be tax free.

The opinion continued:

"The exemption of certain primary foods has the practical effect of relieving the dairyman, fruitgrower, vegetable grower and poultryman from any tax whatever under this act."

"The general farmer, selling grain, hay and livestock is classified as a wholesaler, except where he sells at retail direct to the final consumer. He would be subject to the tax at the wholesale rate of one-quarter of one per cent on his gross income derived from sales of such personal property as is not exempt, or the amount of \$2 on each \$1,000 of taxable gross income."

Van Winkle said the act neither provides nor prohibits the merchant from adding the tax as a separate and specific charge to the selling price of his goods.

In case the sales tax is adopted persons over 65 years of age would be eligible to participate.

The tax commission estimated that the average pension under the law would exceed \$20 per month, as against the average \$10.65 at the present time.
