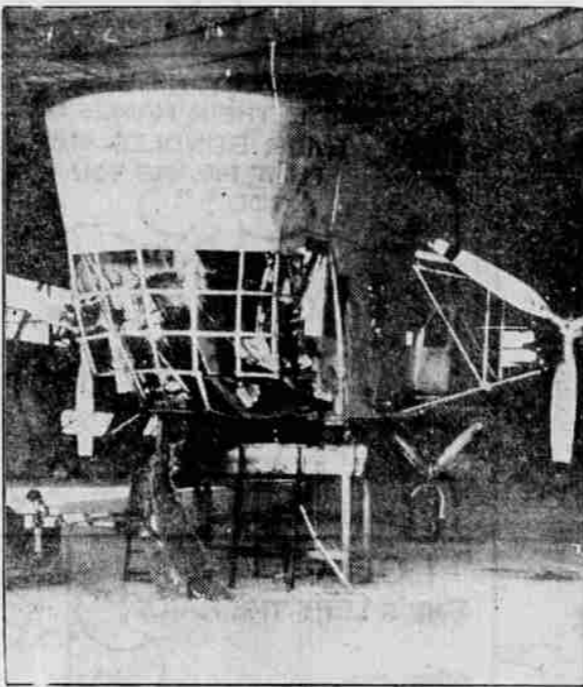

FIRE DESTROYS HOSPITAL ANNEX

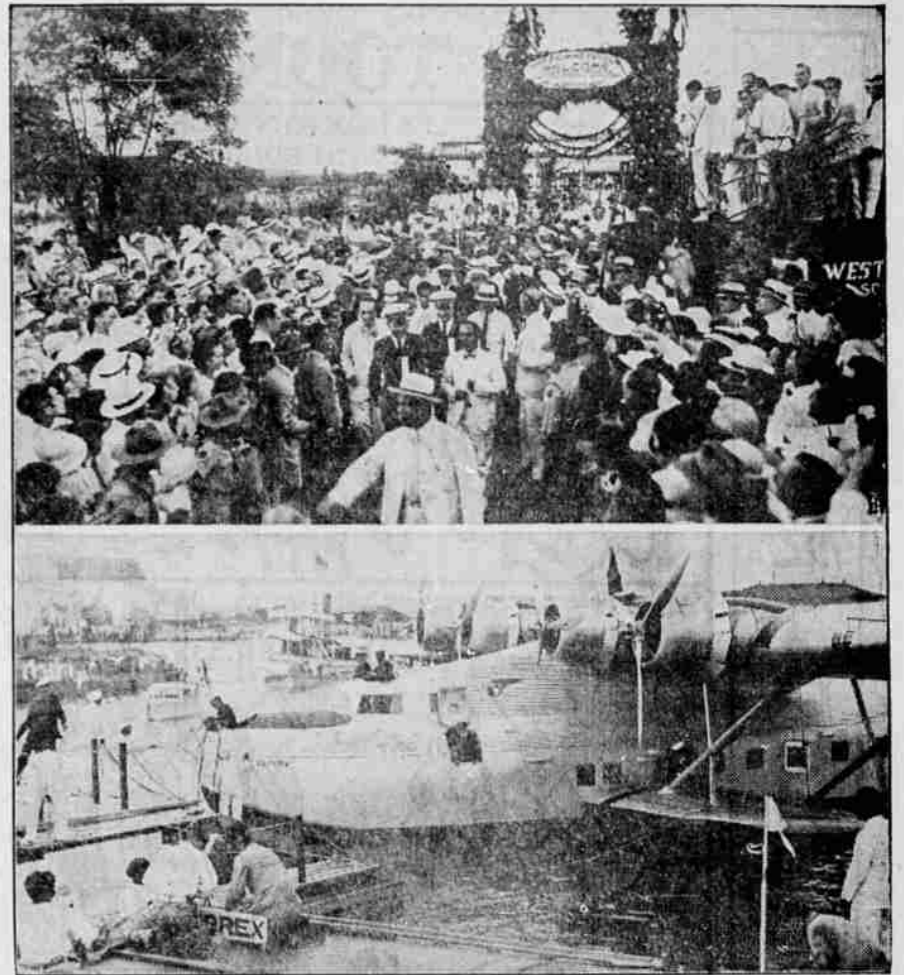

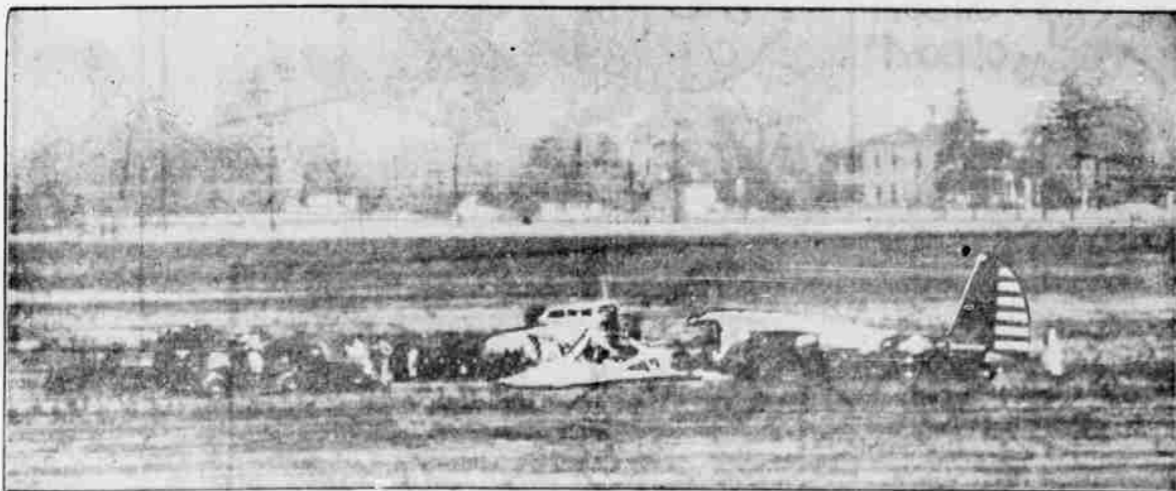
