

CHICAGO BABE IS NAMED 'MEDFORD' AS PEAR TRIBUTE

Wrapper On Pear Gave Inspiration, C. of C. Is Informed by Boy's Kin.

At last a baby has been named after Medford, Oregon. It wasn't a local baby either, it was a Chicago baby.

A letter telling of this incident was received yesterday from Marion Gordon, 5000 North Troy street, Chicago.

When Mr. Conner was shown the letter he gasped. "My gosh," "My gosh," he repeated. "I've shipped pears all over the world and I've had responses from Calcutta, Liverpool, Montevideo, Addis Ababa, Halifax and other such places, but this is the climax. This tops them all."

Every year shipped out of Medford has a wrapper stamped with the trade name and a notice that a recipe book may be procured by writing to the Jackson County chamber of commerce.

"I bought some of the Guy Conner brand of pears of Medford, Oregon, and were very much pleased with them. We enjoyed their firmness and juice."

"Along with other fruit we took some of these excellent pears to a patient in a hospital. We did not notice that the wrappers were on the pears but when the baby came the first name chosen for him was Medford. We were surprised to hear that and then we learned that the name was found on the wrapper around the pears."

"I have a brother in the CCC camp in Medford, Oregon, and he wrote home to us and told us of the pears that grow on the camp grounds. We thought the naming of this baby, which is my nephew, was a coincidence with the pears and where they came from."

Oregon Dead

Dr. E. E. Goucher MEMINVILLE, Ore., Dec. 28.—(P)—Dr. E. E. Goucher, 77, dean of the medical profession in Yamhill county, died here today. He was born in Sonoma county, California, in 1858, and was six years old when his parents, Dr. and Mrs. George W. Goucher, moved to Oregon.

His early schooling was at Dallas and Richland. He studied medicine at the old Willamette university medical school.

After one year as physician for the Northern Pacific railroad in Montana, he came to McMinnville 54 years ago and practiced here continuously since.

Two years ago physicians from Marion, Polk and Yamhill counties gathered here to pay tribute to the pioneer surgeon who then was celebrating his 75th birthday.

He is survived by his widow, Hattie Sherman Goucher; two daughters, Norma Porter of Santa Rosa, Cal., and Rita Goucher, of Salem.

Mrs. Anna C. Swanson MARSHFIELD, Ore., Dec. 28.—(P)—The body of Mrs. Anna C. Swanson, 64, was found hanging at her home today. She had been ill for several months. The extent of Palmer's injuries had not been determined.

Clayton H. Isaac, secretary of the Palmer Music & Electric store and son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Palmer, was informed of the accident yesterday by telephone. The message he received, he explained, stated that Mrs. Palmer suffered serious injuries, including a broken arm and severe lacerations, and that Mr. Palmer was not badly hurt and was not to be detained at the hospital. Their car, Mr. Isaac was told, was badly damaged.

Mr. and Mrs. Palmer had visited their daughter, Mrs. Edwin Thomas, in Salem during the Christmas holidays. They left yesterday morning on their return to Medford. Their residence is on the Old Stage Road.
