Still pulsing with dramatic events that held the world, the year 1935 marches past in picture review.

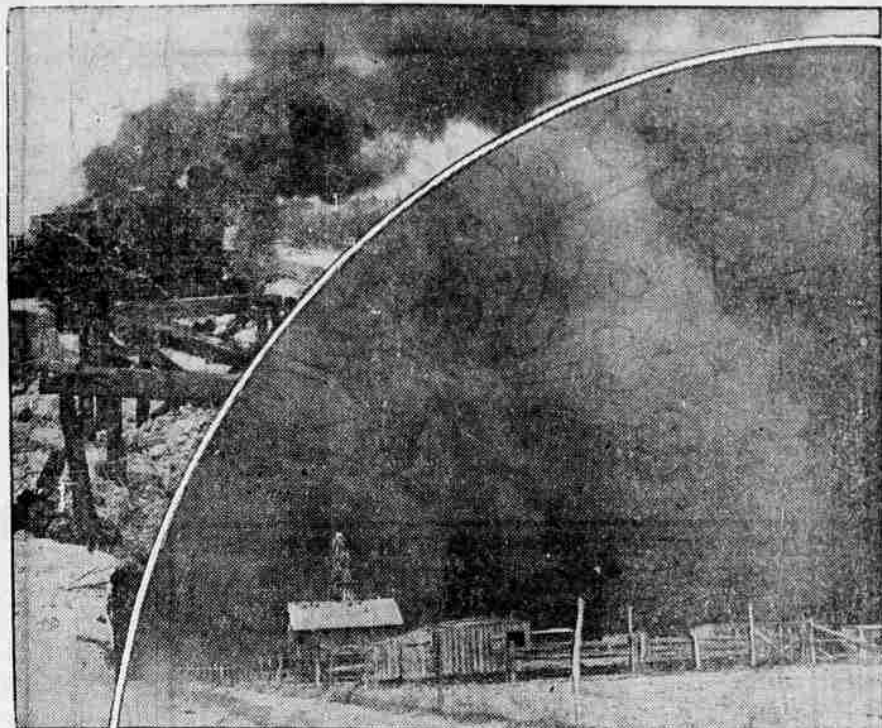

Germany rearms . . . Premier Mussolini hurls his fascist columns into an undeclared war with Ethiopia.

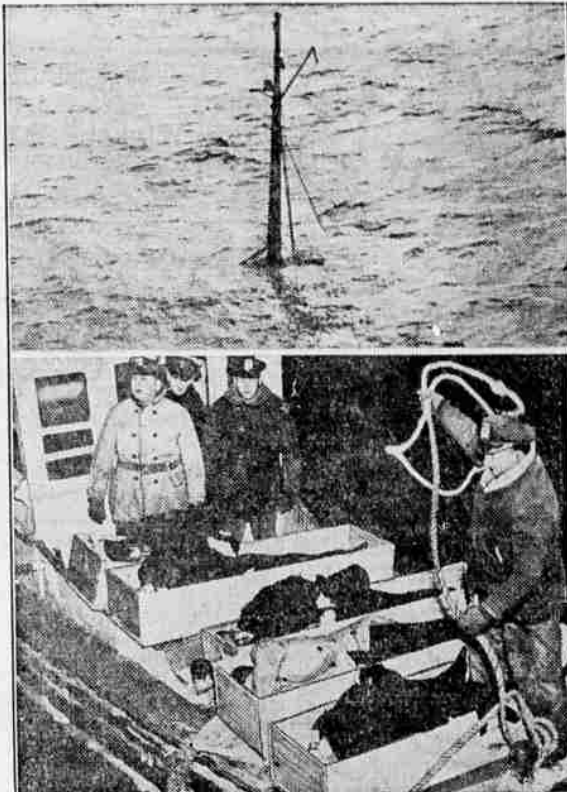

The supreme court declares NRA unconstitutional and the blue eagle ceases to beat his wings.

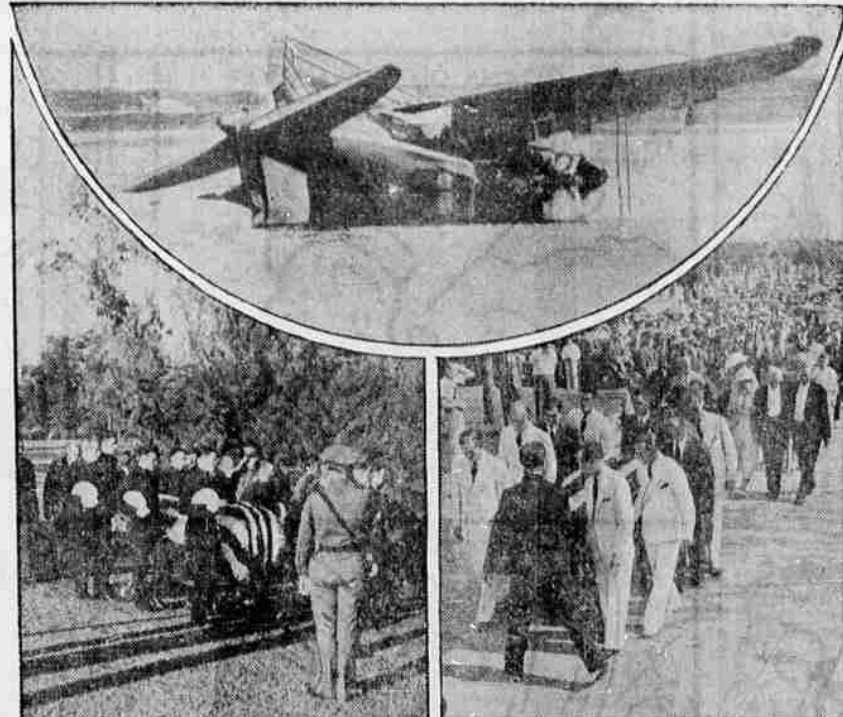
Progress is written as a great flying boat sweeps across the Pacific on a new route to the far east via the air.

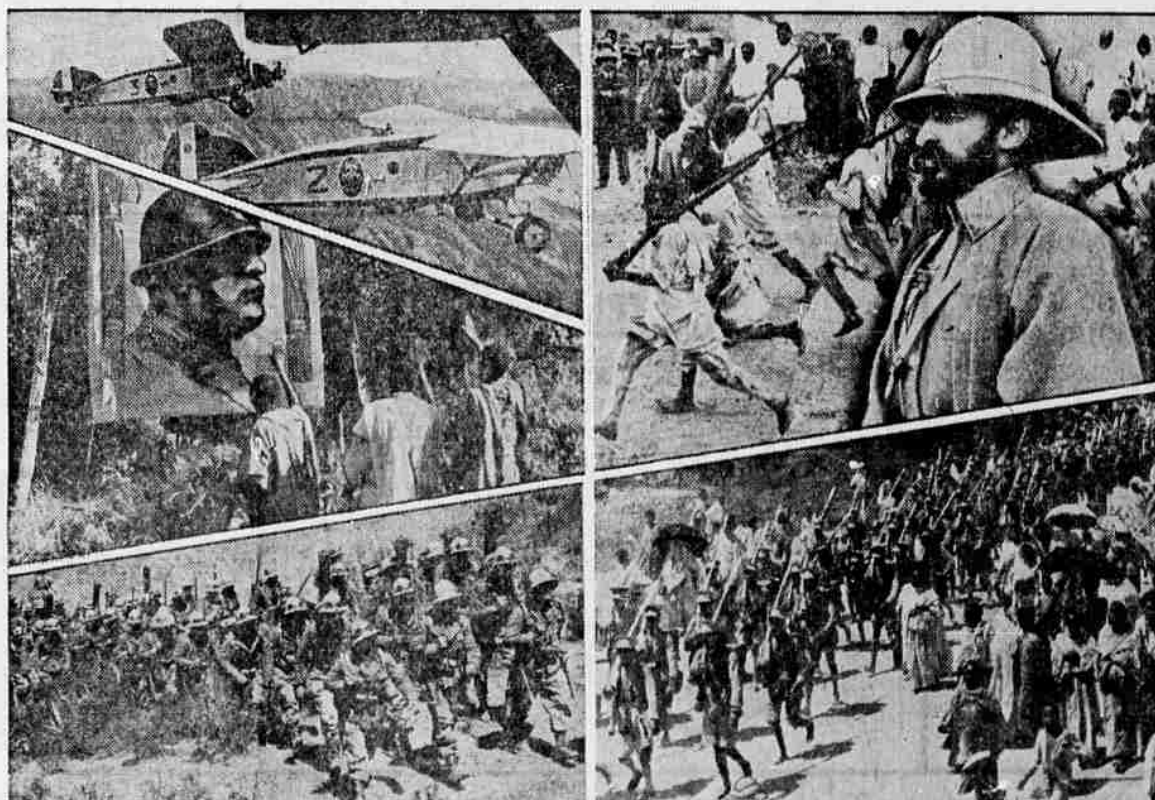
