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7 MEDFORD AREA CCC'S TO DISBAND; TO BE REPLACED

Seven Medford district CCC companies will be disbanded during the next two weeks and five new companies will be sent to the district from the middle west, Maj. George R. Owens, district commander, announced yesterday.

The companies to be disbanded are Co. 1982, Camp Gasquet; Co. 964, Wimer; Co. 1919, Clear Lake; Co. 223, Steamboat; Co. 234, Elk Creek; Co. 290, Applegate; and Co. 1211, Sitkum. Co. 1822, now at Coos Head, will replace Co. 1211 at Sitkum.

The five companies to be sent here from the seventh corps area have not been announced but it is believed they will occupy all of the above named camps except Coos Head and Elk Creek.

The disbandment of a number of CCC companies is in line with Director Robert Fechner's plan to reduce the civilian conservation corps to its original strength of 300,000 men, at which quota it is hoped to maintain the corps on a permanent basis, Major Owens said.

The four second corps area companies included in the seven to be disbanded will leave the Medford district in time to arrive at Camp Dix, New Jersey, January 14. These companies are located at Steamboat, Elk Creek, Applegate and Sitkum.

The three ninth corps area companies to be disbanded before Jan 10 are located at Gasquet, Wimer and Clear Lake. Ninety men from Gasquet will be sent to the Sacramento, Cal., district and the rest will be transferred within the Medford district. Thirty men from Wimer will go to the Boise, Idaho, district and the remainder will remain here. Fifty veterans at Clear Lake will be sent to the Fort George, Wash., district and the others will remain here.

Eleven officers from the second corps area are on duty in this district. They will return with the special trains carrying the CCC men to Camp Dix. Not all officers at present on duty with the second corps area companies are from that corps area and transfers will be made before the companies leave.

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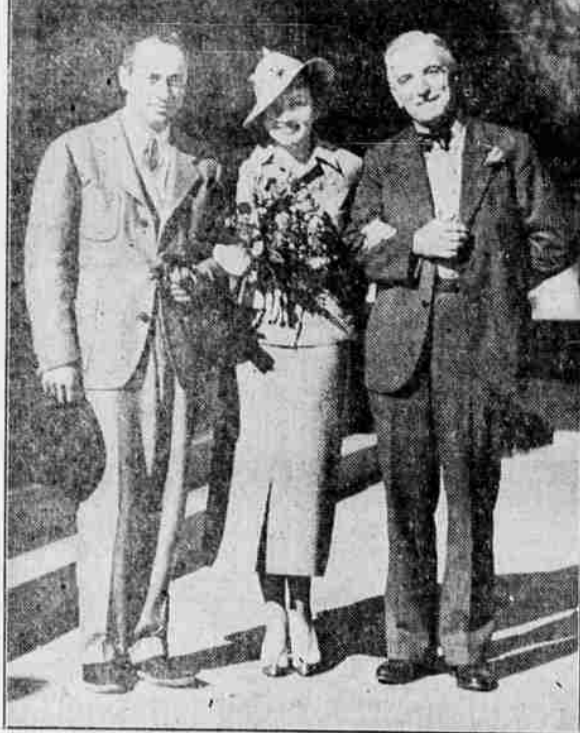
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CLAUDETTE COLBERT WED IN YUMA

SPUD GROWERS OF WHITTILING SKILL VIEWED AS AID FOR ENGINEERS

CLAMATH FALLS, Dec. 28.—(AP)—Klamath potato farmers, many of them vigorously opposed to the act, are being initiated into the intricacies of the Warren potato control law this week-end in a series of meetings addressed by O. K. Beala, state potato adjuster.

Hentley and Merrill farmers met yesterday, a session was held at Malin today, and the Bonanza conference will be held Monday.

Indicative of intense feeling over the bill, yesterday's meeting at Hentley threatened to become a stormy affair. Boos and laughter greeted a change made by one farmer that either "resign as a member of the executive committee of the Klamath county potato growers association or quit acting as a tool of Secretary Wallace and the men in Washington who are trying to separate farmers into a class and put bill rings in their noses."

Order was restored amid applause when Henderson explained that the executive board had done all in its power to prevent the passage of the Warren act, but that now it becomes his duty merely to explain it and assist in carrying out what had become an established law.

About 200 were at this meeting, and scores of other farmers attended sessions at Malin and Merrill. Each district named members of a nominating committee which will choose the county potato control administration committee.

WHITTILING SKILL VIEWED AS AID FOR ENGINEERS

COLUMBUS, O. (UP)—The art of whittling, once a favorite hobby of men and boys with "time on their hands," but now almost forgotten, may be revived to become an interesting and useful profession—that of building models for engineering purposes.

That's the opinion of Samuel T. Carpenter, for the past two years a member of the engineering faculty at Ohio State university and now on the staff at Swarthmore college whose views were expressed in an article written for the Engineering Experiment News, published at Ohio State university.

According to Carpenter, the engineer who is handy with a knife has a distinct advantage, with the increased use of models in engineering, and his adds, "model engineering is in its infancy."

"Building models has often been thought a hobby, the making of an elegant sailing ship for the mantelpiece being the goal of every home craftsman." It has become much more," Carpenter said.

"The hobby followers have unconsciously developed their art of representing detail at the point where engineers, beset with problems of analysis and verification, have elected to use models to help them in their calculations."

He cited as examples the San Francisco-Oakland bridge and Boulder dam, both of which were verified by models.

In the old days of engineering, Carpenter said, much construction was done on the "make-and-break" or "shot in the dark" plan. This was costly and the final results uninterpretable. Now through the use of models, engineers are more certain of results, he claimed.

BRUNO'S NEMESIS MAY GIVE LEGAL VIEW ON REPRIEVE

TRENTON, N. J., Dec. 28.—(AP)—Attorney General David T. Wiltz, who prosecuted Bruno Richard Hauptmann for the Lindbergh baby slaying, may be asked to pass upon Governor Harold G. Hoffman's authority to grant the condemned man a reprieve.

The governor expressed belief yesterday that his authority to defer execution of Hauptmann, should the court of pardons deny him clemency, might have expired about May 13, 1935.

The state constitution provides for executive reprieve any time within 90 days after "conviction." Hauptmann was convicted at Flemington last February 13.

The governor said he might ask the attorney general to determine whether "conviction" meant the jury's verdict or the end of all legal moves by a condemned man's counsel in the higher courts.

Governor Hoffman said his attitude toward the Hauptmann case was "still one of inquiry."

SALES TAX NEED TO HELP SOCIAL SECURITY TALKED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—(AP)—The idea of levying sales taxes on luxuries to support the New Deal's social security program was suggested today by Chairman Buchanan (D., Tex.) of the house appropriations committee.

Such levies would be substitutes for the taxes on payrolls and employees which the security act now provides, Buchanan said.

"I see no reason why the employer of eight or more persons, or even the employes who have jobs, should be heavily taxed to pay insurance to those out of work."

"Besides, it would impose a tremendous accounting burden on the employes themselves that would have to be duplicated in large part by the federal government here. That could all be avoided by a sales tax on luxuries. It would raise an adequate amount to finance the program."

Under the act as now drawn, a one per cent tax on payrolls of employers of eight or more persons goes into effect January 1, 1936 to finance unemployment insurance, with one per cent added each year until 3 per cent is reached in 1938. The contributory old-age pension program ultimately will be financed by a 3 per cent tax on payrolls and 3 per cent on employee wages.

MILLION PROFIT ON BOOZE SALES

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 28.—(AP)—The Oregon liquor control board said today gross sales in state-owned stores and agencies totaled \$5,209,559 for the first 11 months of this year. An estimated \$750,000 for December will bring the year's total to around \$5,959,559. The net profit for the year will be about \$1,980,000, the board said.

The liquor board has turned over \$903,827 to the Oregon unemployment relief fund this year.

In 1934 the gross sales totaled \$3,154,506, but the liquor control system was not in operation the first two months of that year.
