Hawley Moore, a staunch westerner from Summit avenue, was found paired against Frank Rees, a South Oklahoite. So the committee in charge of Lynchburg settled the whole matter today by pairing Moore against Green and Miller against Rees, satisfying nearly everyone.

George Hunt, one of the west side members, today was heard to remark "Those Mexicans across the tracks haven't a chance," while the "Mexicans" continued to keep their mouths tightly closed, apparently preferring to do their battling on the links.

"They're just waiting to keep their courage up," Hank Pringle of the east side today.

Jack Hudson, pro at the club, again today reminded the players to get in touch with their opponents and arrange their playing time. The first match will drive off at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning. Luncheon will be served at the clubhouse at noon.

CENTRAL PT. BOYS WAIT COURT WORD IN COUNTY LOCKUP

Chester Kamberg, Jack Gilaspoy and Ross Painter, Central Point youths, who entered pleas of guilty to burglarizing the Central Point school buildings over the week-end, appeared in circuit court this morning, and final disposition of their cases was taken under advisement by Judge D. Norton. They were remanded to the county jail, pending the court decision.

Harold VanDyke, 15-year-old Central Point youth, paroled from the state reform school last June, and implicated in the schoolhouse robbery, was scheduled to appear in juvenile court this afternoon.

Kamberg, Gilaspoy and Painter are between 16 and 19 years of age, and have never before been in trouble.

The loot was listed as a pocket-knife, a cheap watch, and one penny. Both the senior high school, and grade school buildings at Central Point were entered. Access was gained through the fire escapes.

Besides the schoolhouse entry, the youths were charged with stealing a quantity of wine from a relative of one of the lads. They blamed their crime on "drinking too much of it."

Parents of the trio, in statements to the court said the youths worked when they had a chance, and were good boys.

"You fellows are trying to break into the penitentiary," the court warned the defendants, "and if you keep up your present punk, you will be accommodated." It seems to be quite a practice for young men to drink liquor, and commit crimes, and then blame it on the lawyer. I am surprised at the apparent number of young men who are content to let their parents keep them, instead of getting out and hustling for themselves. You have committed a penitentiary offense. The court will think the matter over for a couple of days. In the meantime you will remain in the county jail."

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 31.—(AP)—Industrial activity at its end of November was at its highest point since July, 1933, according to a survey conducted by the Associated Press. Modernization projects and building repairs resulting from the better housing program contributed substantially to the industrial revival, according to estimates of the Federal Housing Administration.
