Col. Lindbergh, the Morgan spokesman said, probably will make no public statement until he has had time to survey the situation.
Members of the crew of the Amer-

ican Importer, on which the Lindberghs arrived this noon, said they understood the voyage from America was made to avoid being in the United States at the time of the execution of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, condemned to die as the Lindbergh kidnaper during the week of January 18.
Business Not Factor.
The Morgan spokesman, however, indicated the Lindberghs' motive was more complex, and added business had "nothing whatever to do with the visit."
Employees aboard the ship also reported they had overheard Lindbergh at dinner during the voyage, saying: "We are not going to Paris; we are staying in England."
He did not, however, indicate the length of the stay.
W. H. Gregory of Morgan, Grenfell & Co., acting as Col. Lindbergh's personal representative in Liverpool,

was asked if the Lindberghs will establish a residence in Britain and what were their exact reasons for leaving America.
He merely replied:
"Col. Lindbergh will not give any interview or issue any statement today. The family intends to rest for the remainder of the day."
At the Aedepi hotel it was indicated the trio would remain overnight.
The Lindberghs made a hurried transfer from boat to taxi today, dashing down the gangplank of the importer to be whisked into the heart of Liverpool to their hotel, escorted by a carload of detectives.
They were the only passengers on the boat.

May Strike Elsewhere.
The British fear is based on the belief that Mussolini must give a favorable accounting to the Italian people for his military activities and, in the absence of outstanding successes in Ethiopia, London fears he

may strike elsewhere to divert the attention of his nation.
Just as Il Duce desires colonies, so does Adolf Hitler. This, coupled with the vast program of militarization in the Nazi Reich, gives the diplomats of France and Britain something else to worry over. If Germany returns to Geneva and if it enters into any pact guaranteeing the status quo of Europe, it seems up to the British to persuade Hitler.
As a reward, Hitler surely would demand the return of at least some of the colonies taken from Germany by the treaty of Versailles.
Fear German Rearmament.
German rearmament to a great extent is responsible for the diplomatic maneuvering for the pact continuing over Europe. The pact between France and Soviet Russia, negotiated out of professed fears of the Nazi regime, still remains to be ratified by the French parliament. To offset this,

the Nazis seek allies to the south, to drive a wedge between Paris and Moscow.
Soviet Russia also professes great fears in the Far East. It looks like distrust on the combination of Japan and Manchukuo and it builds a common defense with strategically placed outer Mongolia.
Observers, recalling lesser crises which have precipitated widespread war, can only see dark clouds over Africa, Europe and Asia.
National Affairs.
As consequential as are all these factors to the powers of the world, the dominant interest in the American scene in 1936 is the presidential campaign.
The New Deal, with its changes in relationship of government to society, comes before the nation with one principal issue:
New Deal Issue.
Shall the New Deal be continued?

The forces in power have their candidate, Franklin Delano Roosevelt; they have their platform, the New Deal.
The oppositionists — Republicans, dissatisfied Democrats, and forces of industry and business acting more or less independently against the administration—still must obtain both.
Will the candidate be one of those talked of today — Borah, Landon, Knox, Vandenberg—or a "dark horse" as in 1920? Or will it again be Herbert Hoover?
The New Deal is ready to be battle, but it may be forced to make changes before the election. The supreme court, early in the new year, will decide on the constitutionality of some of the principal New Deal measures: The agricultural adjustment act, with its processing tax; the Tennessee Valley authority, and the cotton control act.
The Wagner labor disputes bill and

others also seem destined for a hearing before the nation's highest court.
But the basis of the New Deal has been built. It combines to make the philosophy of national planning, of a government-led program for social security, of stricter government regulation of government operation as a "yardstick."
It accentuates an underlying issue: Constitutional revision. Whether it appears as an outright issue, constitutional revision nevertheless is deep-rooted in the campaign of '36.
