

ROGUE REACHES TOPMOST POINT IN THREE YEARS

Rogue river reached its greatest height and volume of flow yesterday morning since January 2, 1933, California Oregon Power company records disclosed today. The river has been swollen the past few days by heavy rains and snows in the valley and along its headwaters.

At 11 a. m. yesterday the amount of water flowing past the Gold Ray station of the power company was measured as 15,100 cubic feet a second. This compares with the previous record volume of 17,800 second feet measured exactly three years ago on January 2, 1933, and with the all-time record of 91,500 feet registered February 21, 1927, the time of the big flood.

The Rogue also reached its greatest height at 11 a. m. yesterday since January 2, 1933. The peak recorded at Gold Ray dam yesterday was 7.6 feet as compared with 8.5 feet January 2, 1933, and 24.8 feet, the all-time high registered February 21, 1927.

Between 6 o'clock Wednesday evening and 8 o'clock yesterday morning 1.59 inches of rain fell at Fish Lake. Source of the irrigation water supply of the Medford district, according to a report received by the local Medford district office. It was one of the heaviest sustained rains in the records of the irrigation. During the same period a heavy rain fell throughout the entire mountainous area of eastern Jackson county.

Snow depth at Fish Lake, before the rain, measured 20 inches, and afterward showed a depth of 18 inches. The caretaker reported that none of the snow had melted, but had been packed and soaked and settled by the moisture.

The weather bureau's forecast was for occasional rain tonight and tomorrow, with slightly warmer temperatures this evening. The valley is still under the influence of a low pressure area centered off Puget Sound and conditions will continue unsettled until the low passes to the eastward or is dissipated, the bureau explained.

Piers Swept Away
GRANTS PASS, Jan. 3.—(AP) After reaching the highest mark here in three years yesterday, Rogue river was receding today. At 3 p. m. Thursday the stream was 8.6 feet above last summer's low mark.

At its peak yesterday, the river swept fishing piers from their moorings. In about 15 minutes one man saw five piers float down stream.

A cool drizzle this morning sent temperatures down from 50 to 38 degrees in about one hour.

Lower Columbia Bares Artifacts Of Ancient Race

THE DALLES, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Mud banks along the Columbia river near here yielded a rare collection of prehistoric relics to C. A. Klindt of The Dalles, who took advantage of the unprecedented low stage of the river to dig for artifacts.

He announced the discovery of bowls, pebbles and food grinding equipment believed to have been left by a race that antedated the Indians which abounded in this area at the coming of the Lewis and Clark expedition.

The same prehistoric people are accredited with leaving the cryptic writings found on cliffs along the Columbia river in this district.
