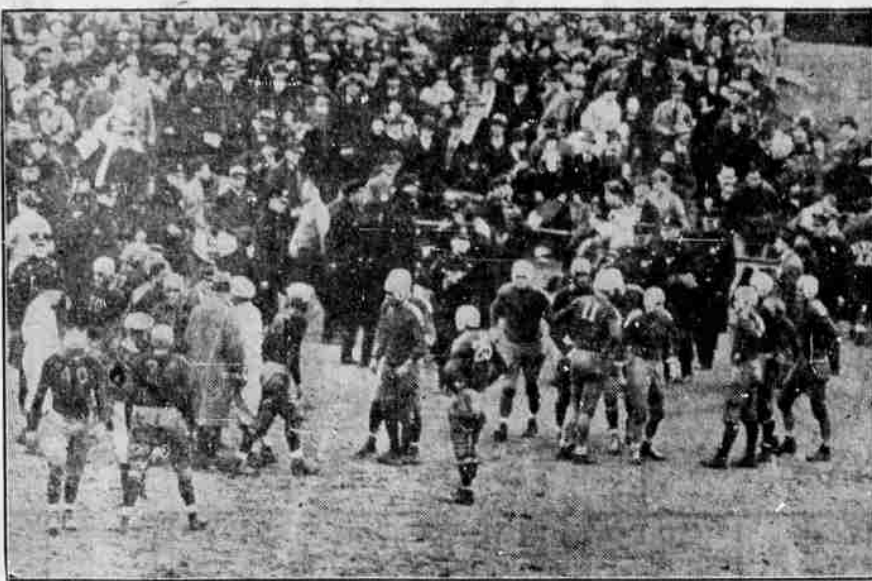


GAY TRAIL ENDS FOR GRADUATES AND GIRL FRIEND

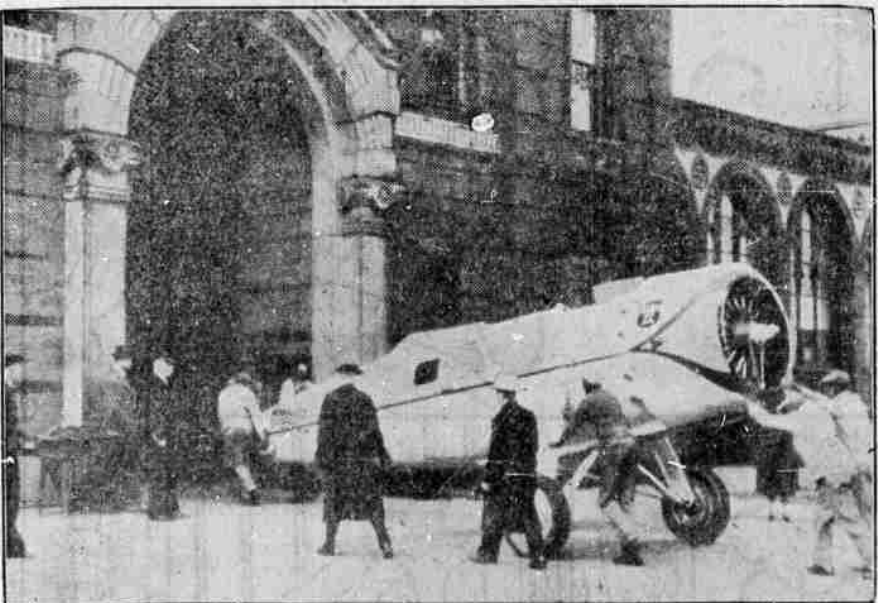

WHERE KINGSFORD-SMITH IS LOST

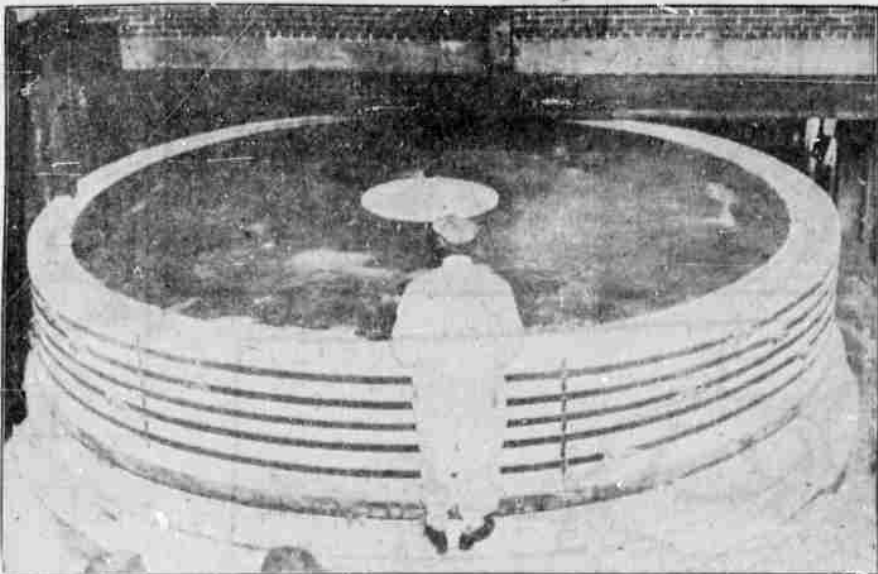
