AUTO TAG SALES PASS 1935 MARK

SALEM, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Sale of the 1936 automobile license plates has reached the estimated half way mark for Oregon last night and in addition showed an increase of 27,715 pairs of plates over the amount sold the same period last year. Total plates sold were 149,663 at the close of business January 3.

The secretary of state, who had opened the two sub-stations at Eugene and Oregon City as experimental places for direct license sales, was watching the reports from these places with interest. Should he find the extra service to the public pays, he will open others next year. To date each had sold about 6000 plates, with the Eugene station leading.

Strict enforcement of the license law by state police was expected to start next week.

CONG. MOTT AMONG TOWNSEND AIDES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—(AP)—The Townsend National Weekly today claimed 39 congressmen as having promised to support the Townsend old age pension plan this session of congress.

The weekly listed the congressmen as having so signified their intention in reply to a questionnaire sent out by headquarters of the drive for \$200-a-month payments to those over 60 years.

As of December 20, the Weekly said, 60 replies had been received. Of these, it said 39 signified support; five were opposed; two were non-committal and 14 were undecided.

HOLMAN ELIGIBLE TO RUN AGAIN, IS VAN WINKLE WORD

SALEM, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Rufus C. Holman's determination to seek reelection as state treasurer was seen today when he received an opinion from the attorney general, who he had requested, ruling that he would be eligible under the constitution to serve another term were he re-elected.

Under the constitution was selected General I. H. Van Winkle pointed out, the secretary of state and the state treasurer were ineligible to hold their offices more than eight years in any period of twelve years.

Holman was appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late Tom Kay May 1, 1931 and elected November 8, 1932. His present term expires January 4, 1937 one year from today.

Van Winkle further pointed out the constitution provides that an "appointment pro tempore shall not be reckoned a part of that term (eight years continuously)."

Concluding Van Winkle ruled that "since the time during which you (Holman) served as treasurer under an appointment pro tempore is not to be reckoned as a part of the term by article VI, section 1, it is my opinion that you are eligible to qualify as state treasurer should you be re-elected to succeed yourself at the expiration of your present term."

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MEDFORD SAVINGS PAYS DIVIDENDS, ASSETS INCREASE

Payment yesterday by the Medford Federal Savings & Loan Association of the regular semi-annual dividend at the rate of 4 per cent per annum was announced by J. H. Fletcher, secretary-manager. The dividend, payable on all classes of shares, was declared as of December 31.

In announcing the dividend payment, Mr. Fletcher pointed to improvement in business during 1935 and expressed confidence that the trend toward normal economic conditions would continue in 1936.

The association had an increase in assets of \$108,818, or 177 per cent during the past year, records showed. The increase was attributed by Mr. Fletcher to subscription to shares by the federal treasury, the home owners' loan corporation and local investors.

The association's third semi-annual statement, as of December 31, 1935, showed total resources of \$1,012,877. Mortgage loans and unpaid balances totaled \$160,203.

Eighty-eight new loans aggregating \$129,770 were made during 1935, records disclosed. The loans were mainly for construction, repair and refinancing.

"A large number of new savings accounts were started in 1935, especially during December," Mr. Fletcher stated. "This indicates a general improvement of conditions."

Inquiry in regard to new construction is more brisk than at any other time since our organization. This activity will tend to relieve the present scarcity of housing facilities."

The association was organized in October, 1934, and has since shown a steady growth.
