WIMER WILL BE FILLED BY NEW GROUP OF CCC

CAMP WIMER, Jan. 6. (Sp.)-While abandonment has been ordered for the all-Oregon company 964, Camp Wimer is not to be discontinued.

According to present plans, a 7th corps company, probably from Nebraska, will occupy the camp and continue work on Wimer's partially completed 28 mile system of roads and telephone lines, which will eventually be the important units in District Foreman Dwight Phillips' forest fire protection system. The new company will probably arrive in time to resume work with only a minor interruption.

Local experienced men will remain, according to present plans, to furnish key men for the new company. According to latest word received by Project Superintendent Paul L. Thompson, the forestry foremen who direct the work on this camp will remain to direct the work of the new company.

The disposition of the company's officers has not been announced. They are Capt. Guy W. Saunders, commanding Lt. Andrew J. Hamstreet, Lt. Robert Colwell, Lt. A. Adland, Donald Mace, educational adviser.

Company 964 is to be divided into four units each of which is to be sent to one of four camps, Bradford, By and South Umpqua Falls in the Medford district and Nyssa, Boise, in the Idaho district.
