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Label Guide for Pear Buyers Aids Over-Seas Firms

Oregon-Washington Pear Bureau Lists Members

Putting Out Quality Pack — Objectives Are Listed

Copies of the new "label guide" issued by the Oregon-Washington Pear Bureau have just been received by local members of the bureau and are being displayed in their office. This guide is in the form of a wall hanger, designed to acquaint the overseas buyers of pears with the brands of members of the pear bureau, and is the first thing of its kind to be issued by the fruit industry of the northwest.

This advance marks a turn in industrial relations in that it stresses the new policy of the pear bureau to limit its membership to only those who put out a quality pack of pears.

Local Members Listed

Local shippers who are members of the pear bureau and whose brands appear on this label are as follows: American Fruit Growers, Inc., Bear Creek Orchards (Rosenberg Bros.), Del Rio Orchards, Newbery Bros., Pacific Fruit & Produce Co., Palmer Corporation, Pinnacle Packing Co., Rogue River Company, and Southern Oregon Sales, Inc.

The multi-colored labels of the pear shippers make the hanger very colorful and attractive, and particularly savors of the northwest with the pictures on the labels for the most part featuring mountains, bears, parks, orchards, Indiana, birds and snowmen.

Beneath the reproduction of the labels are given the various brands of each shipper, together with mail and cable address.

Other copy on the label reads as follows:

"In order that overseas buyers of Oregon and Washington late pears may have quick information as to the firms with whom they do business, this label guide has been prepared.

Fourfold Purpose

"The firms and co-operative organizations whose names appear here comprise the shipper members of the Oregon-Washington Pear Bureau, which has for its purposes: (1) To improve the quality pack of its members. (2) To widen the outlet for winter pears grown in the states of Oregon and Washington. (3) To increase the good will between the United States and those countries interested in promoting friendly trade relations. (4) To disseminate accurate information about the proper care and handling of our fruits for the benefit of overseas and domestic buyers.

Proper handling is more important with winter pears than any other fruit. Buyers are urged to make their purchases from shippers or co-operative organizations who have control of the fruit from the time it leaves the tree until it is placed in the car. These concerns operate their own packing and cold storage plants and maintain staffs of expert horticulturists who assist the growers in producing quality fruit. Many brokers buy their fruit from various concerns, individual growers, etc. who do not have the facilities to make the guarantee of standard quality pack. When buying pears from brokers, insist upon a known label for your protection.

Research Work Aids

"The research work of Prof. Henry Hartman, who has been retained in advisory capacity for the pear bureau, shows that the handling during the first few hours after picking, and placing in cold storage immediately, has much to do in the later life of winter pears.

Buyers of winter pears are assured that the firms whose labels appear on this page have a reputable standing in the industry and have adequate physical equipment and cold storage plants to handle these pears properly in the quickest possible time.

"Correspondence with buyers on their problems will receive our careful attention."
