A Shocking Tragedy

MARITIME disasters are so rare these days—thanks largely to the radio, —that the loss of the freighter Iowa, off the mouth of the Columbia river yesterday, with all hands on board, comes as a distinct shock.

According to the Oregonian, in the last 87 years there have been only 87 serious wrecks off the Oregon and Washington coasts,-an average of one per year. Since 1929 there have been four wrecks, near Peacock Spit where the Iowa went down In two of these no lives were lost; in each of the other two there was but one fatality. Considering the number of ships that go in and out of the Columbia, and the high and dangerous seas that prevail in those waters, this is a remarkable record.

TRAVEL by sea and air have one danger in common. The nearer a ship is to land, and the nearer an airplane is to the ground, the greater the danger. And the reason is the same: a restricted area in which to maneuver for safety.

Had the Iowa been able to get out to sea, no doubt the disaster would have been avoided. But the fury of the storm broke, when it was close to shore, and the results were disas trous,-thirty-four officers and men met a watery grave

THE lesson to be learned from this catastrophe,—the worst in recent history of Oregon shipping,-appears fairly obvious even to a landlubber. When storm signals are set, it is foolish to attempt crossing the bar at the mouth of the Columbia, in either direction. Better to delay a voyage 24 hours, than take a chance of getting caught like a rat in a trap, with only about one chance in a hundred of "dat of debbil sea" not coming out
