On the way they meet Joe Penner, who is a victim of amnesia. The four join forces and proceed to the school, which proves a major disappointment because of its mid-Victorian atmosphere.
Oakie and his cohorts begin to make things hum from the beginning. They change the seminary into a "charm school," substitute the saxophone for the sither and shores for bloomers, and bring some lively music into the place.
Several embarrassing moments arise, but the fates are kind to the boys, as well as to Miss Langford, who has her first important acting part in pictures, and who sings as beautifully as she ever did. Her featured number is "Will I Ever Know?"
Penner's antics in trying to determine his identity as well as his romance with one of the girl students, Betty Grable, prove his right to the huge popularity he has achieved in the last two years, both in radio and on the screen.
