FOREST RANGERS HOLD CONFERENCE ON STOCK PLANS

A conference of district rangers of the Rogue River national forest was held in federal building today to initiate a study of the commensurability of ranch property owned by stock men who have grazing permits in the forest domain. The meeting was supervised over by Karl L. Janouch, supervisor, and attended by H. O. Obye, assistant.

The study involves a personal visit by a ranger to each ranch to determine the amount of stock and land owned and the forage crops raised and fed by the stockman, Mr. Janouch explained.

The number of stock which may be approved for grazing is based upon the ranger's findings, the supervisor said. The forest service regulations provide that preference be given to stockmen owning ranches near the forest that will furnish winter feed for the stock grazed on the forest lands during summer, he pointed out.

Rangers in attendance were Lee Fort, Applegate district; Maurice Tidrow, Butte Falls; Jesse DeWitt, Upper Rogue River; and Hugh Ritter, Dead Indian-Klamath Falls.

A special service has been announced by the Methodist Episcopal church for Sunday evening, officials of the church having secured the appearance here of the Olmsted Players, a group of professional religious players in a presentation of a prize Bible drama, "St. Claudis," by Marshall Gould.
