## TIGERS, GRIZZLIES DRILL FOR CLASH FRIDAY, SATURDAY

Faber Hopes To Be On Bench When Charges In-vade Local Court—Baker And Ettinger Shifted.

Coach Don Faber of Ashland, out of basketball seasons for the past two weeks with mumps, will probably be at the helm of his squad in the two game series with the Medford Tigers Friday and Saturday, it was learned today.

Faber's place has been ably filled by Lester Wilson, former Coquille coach now living in Ashland. The squad has been through two victories, both against Grants Pass, under Wilson's guidance, and those who have watched the Grizzlies in action state that the two coaches use practically the same system.

Coach Bowerman of Medford is running his men through long nightly drills in preparation for the crucial series. Already Ashland has taken two games in this district, to give them undisturbed lead for entry into the state tournament.

Medford has not yet played a district team, although holding wins over Salem and Klamath Falls. In February the two teams meet again for another two-game series, and both teams will be fighting hard in the games this week to take the advantage down that home stretch.
