

NEGRO DEFENDERS START NEW FIGHT

DECATUR, Ala., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Attorneys for Heywood Patterson, first of the nine negroes in the Scottsboro assault case to receive a prison verdict, started a new fight today to set him free—only a few hours after a jury convicted him.

"We've got a break now and will fight," said Samuel Leibowitz, New York lawyer who is Patterson's chief counsel.

Patterson's lawyers were heartened by the fact that the 70-year prison term fixed by the jury's verdict late yesterday, was the first instance of a jury agreeing on anything other than a death penalty in the Scottsboro trials.

Patterson and the other negroes are accused of attacking Mrs. Victoria Price and Ruby Bates, white women, aboard a freight train near Scottsboro in March, 1931.

DRAIN FORGER IS SENT TO PRISON

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Pleading guilty to the charge of passing fraudulent checks, Jesse E. Brown was sentenced in the circuit court here late yesterday to four years in the penitentiary.

In 1928, Brown was arrested here on a charge of arson and grand larceny, confessing, Sheriff P. A. Webb states, to burning two buildings at Yoncalla to divert public attention from his attempt to rob the bank there. Brown was frustrated when the woman cashier, left alone in the bank, refused him admission, the doors having been locked. Following his arrest, Brown tunneled out of the county jail and escaped with five other prisoners, but was later captured at Lakeview and returned here. He was committed after a mental examination to the state asylum, where he remained three years.

OREGON ONION CROP GREATEST IN YEARS

SALEM, Ore.—(UP)—Oregon put more onions on the market this season than any time in the last seven seasons, according to production estimates of the federal department of agriculture.

In 100-pound lots, 527,000 sacks were grown for the market, 14 percent above the previous high of 462,000 sacks, the 1-33 crop.

Oregon onions apparently are of extraordinarily good quality this season and the quantity shipped and available for shipment now appears to be even greater than had been anticipated up to December 1, the bureau of agricultural economics said.

GUESTS ESCAPE FIRE IN PORTLAND HOTEL

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Seven patrons trapped by fire and smoke came down ladders to safety early this morning when the Weaver hotel here caught fire.

Firemen carried one woman down. The other six came by themselves. The remainder of the 34 hotel guests dressed hastily and found their way downstairs.

The fire caused an estimated \$5000 damage to six rooms, the attic and roof of the three-story brick structure.

Autoist Outruns Gasoline Blast

GRANT'S PASS, Ore., Jan. 24.—(AP)—A dislocated shoulder might bring real grief to some persons, but to Willard Hannum of Missouri Flat, it couldn't mean much more than a toothache after a hurricane.

Hannum dislocated the shoulder in scrambling from his car when he noticed flames creeping up a five-gallon can of gasoline a few inches from him. He escaped the blast by several feet. The car was destroyed.

Girl Of 19 Seeks Beer Bar Permit

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—(AP)—The city council faced a new problem relative to Oregon liquor control law when Miss Anna Jean Fox, 19, applied for license to operate a beer parlor.

The council took the matter under advisement before making recommendation. No age limit for operators is set in the Knox law, although sale is restricted to those over 21 years of age.

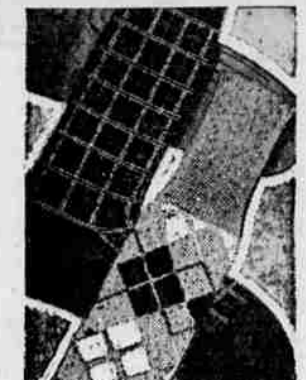

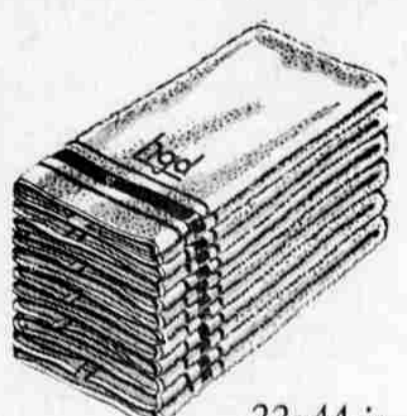
