Missionary Meet Of Presbyterians In Ashland Today

ASHLAND, Jan. 25.—(Spl.)—Dr. Edward A. Odell of New York City, and Dr. James Thomson of Seattle will be speakers at the second annual missionary conference of the First Presbyterian church here today.
Dr. Odell, who will speak at 9:30 and at 7:30, comes from the Department of the West Indies as its director. Dr. Odell spent 18 years in the West Indies, going directly from his courses at Princeton university and seminary to service in that field. Eighteen years of service in the revolution-torn West Indies has qualified him to speak of the necessities which the church faces there, while the position as director of the department has given him the viewpoint of the whole Presbyterian church.
Dr. Thomson, now executive for Washington, Oregon and Idaho for the board, will speak at the morning service.

TOWNSEND AIDES HIT BARDE PLAN

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 25.—(AP)—C. E. Hansen, state area manager for the Townsend revolving pension club, issued a statement today notifying the Townsend organizations that "J. N. (Jack) Barde of Portland has no further connection with the Townsend movement in any official capacity whatsoever."
Hansen said the step was taken "on account of political activities" and because Barde "permitted to be formed the corporation known as Townsendettes, Inc.," for which papers were filed at Salem earlier this week.
The state Townsend headquarters here also said that Robert Zimmerman Adams, national co-ordinator for the movement who came here in September, had been "called to other fields," the Oregonian said tonight.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25.—(UP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend, leader of the old age revolving pension movement, reluctantly deferred tonight plans for launching a third major party to support his movement.
Bowling to pressure of congressional followers, Townsend consented to defer his third party dream until after the nominating conventions of the Republican and Democratic parties this summer.
