Officials here stated yesterday that skiing conditions were ideal on the forest preserve where a slide has been constructed. Half a hundred persons enjoyed skiing at Union Creek Friday they reported. While the highway was still closed between the Diamond lake junction and the west entrance, nevertheless a large crowd of sportsmen was looked for at Crater Lake national park today. The other highways are open so that residents of Klamath Falls, Bend and other cities can motor to the mountain resort.
