KENNASTONS FOUL GIVES DUDE CHICK WINNING TUMBLE

Dude Chick, by virtue of the fact that Bob Kennaston doesn't know a good thing when he sees it, is still tops in local wrestling circles after having won from the old Hill man, on a 10-8 score, the popular top-line of a light's three-star card at the Army.

Chick took the first fall with a bear hug to weaken Kennaston, then a rolling scissors and his own interpretation of the spider web hold, a complicated figure 4 leg scissors, in exactly 30 minutes. Taking the aggressive most of the way, Chick could not get the wary ex-marine into his dangerous tarant spin, nor could he line Kennaston up for his sensational flying shoulder butt, but using a flying leg scissors and a step-over shoulder spread he had Kennaston almost helpless on two occasions.

Kennaston continued his offensive efforts to rabbit punching, slugging and drop-kicking, launching at least ten aerial attacks, none of which hit Chick. After heaving his heavier opponent out of the ring, Kennaston applied a Boston crab which Chick broke. The marine applied another Boston crab shortly afterward, Chick signaled he was down, and Referee Ray Frisbie spent the next several minutes trying to pry the tenacious Kennaston loose, finally awarding the fall and the bout to Chick on a four when Kennaston refused to break. The match was interesting all the way through, Chick displaying several complicated and punishing holds new

to most of his audience, and to Kennaston. In the middle bout Referee Frisbie and Frank Taylor won over Max Glover of Detroit, two out of three falls. There was no fall in the first round of the Australian system match, with Glover swinging Taylor in hammerlocks, and then jumping on the folded shoulder of his enemy to make the lock more effective. Frisbie repeatedly warned Glover against the practice, but with little effect.

Taylor took the first fall in the second round, with a flying head scissors and a roll. Two minutes of wrestling in the third round found Taylor tightly trussed in an octopus hold which it took Frisbie to break. Frisbie's part was not appreciated by Glover.

In the next round, as Glover insisted on choking and slugging, as well as biting, Frisbie took a few wallops at his head, which Glover returned in kind. A wild exchange between Frisbie and Taylor resulted with Taylor walloping one or the other indiscriminately as they ragged past. Frisbie had all the best of it, and the first scrimmage ended with Taylor stuffing Glover over the edge of the ring with his feet.

Several more tussles ensued between the referee and Glover, with the Detroit man finally chucking Taylor out of the ring while Frisbie was getting up off the floor. Taylor, booming back into the ring with a slight shot, flattened Glover for the count with a head butt to end the bout.

Tiger Taskoff of Bulgaria hammered his way to win over Tuffy Cluet in the opener, when he forced the New Yorker to give up for two falls. Cluet took the first with body slams in two minutes, but after an exchange of slams, punches, gouges and kicks lost the next two. In this bout also Frisbie joined the festivities, and exchanged punches with Taskoff several times.

The bouts were ruled the best of the winter season, with science, rough-housing, slugging and near rioting enough to satisfy everyone in the house.

HUSKIES CENTER LEADING SCORER NORTH DIVISION

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 28.—(AP)—Thirty-one points scored against Oregon during the week end gave Ralph Bishop, University of Washington center, the top average in the northern division Pacific coast conference basketball scoring race today. Bishop, twelfth in the standing last week, collected 12 points Friday night and 19 more Saturday to gain a fractional edge over big Ward Howell, Oregon forward, who was shoved down a notch into the runner-up position. The Husky tip-off man has piled up 44 points in four contests for an 11-point average, while Howell, who had averaged 12.3 in his first three games, added 17 against Washington to his total of 64 and an average of 10.8.

WILLIE HUNTER TAKES TOP MONEY IN FRISCO OPEN GOLF TOURNEY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Slender Willie Hunter of Los Angeles, veteran of many golfing campaigns but never before a big money winner, headed for home today with the title of San Francisco match play open champion and a check for \$1,675 in his pocket.

The 43-year old professional claimed top money in the sixth annual tournament here with a 4 to 2 victory over Willie Coggin. San Francisco, in yesterday's 36 hole final. Hunter completed the 18 holes of the afternoon round five strokes under par, the result of a steady putting eye, excellent recoveries and long tee shots.

He clinched the match on the 34th green when he dropped a 30-foot chip shot for a birdie 3 to Coggin's par 4. Par for the Lake Merced course is 35-37-72.

Hunter qualified last Friday with 71-71-142 while Coggin entered the match play through rounds of 72 and 70. Hunter won his first match from Ky Laffoon of Chicago, 2 and 1 and defeated Craig Wood, New York, on the 19th in the semi-final. Coggin's first round victim was Jimmy Thomson of Ridgewood, N. J., whom he defeated 2 and 1 and he entered the finals by eliminating Ray Mangrum, Los Angeles, 3 and 1. Goggin received for \$837.50 as his share of the purse.

ROSS TECHNICALS HALPER IN EIGHTH

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Jan. 28.—(UP)—Welterweight Champion Barney Ross last night launched his campaign to make \$100,000 in 1936 by scoring a technical knockout over rugged Lou Halper of Newark, N. J., in the eighth round of their scheduled 10-round at Convention hall.

Ross' title was not at stake. Although the 147-pound king's first appearance of the year was brilliant, he received only about \$6,000 for his work. Near zero weather held the crowd down to about 7,500, half the hall's capacity.
