Mr. Holmes said. The blanks were rushed by airmail to the Portland office, which is distributing them to posts in the state, he related.

EAGLES TO COMPLETE PLANS FOR INITIATION AT MEETING TONIGHT

Medford Eagles will make final arrangements for the district initiation and reception for George Nordlin, national president, at a meeting to be held at 8 o'clock tonight in the lodge hall on West Main street.

ROOSEVELT SURE OF RE-ELECTION SAYS UNION HEAD

Borah Decides Against Seeking G. O. P. Delegates in Pennsylvania— Landon Has Farm Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Decision by Senator Borah not to seek republican nomination convinced delegates in Pennsylvania, a union leader's prediction that President Roosevelt would be reelected and a

telephone call from Governor Landon made for continued political activity today.

Talking from Topeka for ten minutes with Representative Hope of Ohio, the Kansas governor evidently had farm policy on his mind.

Hope yesterday introduced a farm subsidy plan not unlike some ideas suggested by Landon. There was a tendency by some to consider it a Landon plan, but the house republican leadership and friends of the governor discouraged any discussion of it other than as a tentative possibility for a platform plank.

Hint Borah-Landon Contest. With some allies of Senator Borah taking a critical attitude toward Landon, there was speculation whether contests between the two for delegates in some states might eventuate.

Former Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania disclosed Borah delegates would not be sought there, because it would take more cash than "available."

Victory for President Roosevelt in the election was predicted by Sidney Hillman, president of the Amalgamated

clothing workers, to the United Mine Workers convention.

"I believe that after next November, the powers of reaction will suffer a greater defeat than they suffered a little more than three years ago," he said.

The delegates cheered when Assistant Secretary McGrady of the labor department asked whether they supported the president.

"Let that be the answer to the money bags of Wall street," he shouted as the dirr subsided.

Labor, Be On Guard. "Be on your guard, men of labor. Democrats have lived and died before. Vigilance is ever the price of liberty."

"Subtle propaganda led to European dictatorships, and might precede an attempt to destroy American liberties."

Reminding that the president had been called a socialist, McGrady reviewed new deal measures to relieve unemployment.

"If that is socialism, let the torres and money bags of the nation, make the most of it," he said, and again was applauded.

As he spoke, division in the major parties was illustrated anew. At the capitol, a Borah supporter criticized Gov. Landon of Kansas.

Senator Norbeck (R. S. D.), said the recent Landon speech—the Kansas governor's first broad discussion of national affairs—sounded "like the American liberty league."

Senator Borah (R. Idaho), who is believed by many to be a possible contender with Landon for the republican presidential nomination, made no comment on the Landon speech.

Governor Talmadge, Georgia democrat, went ahead with his plans for a lengthy speaking campaign against

President Roosevelt's renomination, while Harry L. Hopkins, works progress administrator, and Secretary Ickes, public works chief, assailed him.

Hopkins said "some of Talmadge's political cheaters were caught chiseling." He charged that WPA workers were used to mail out Talmadge "campaign literature."
