Oregon Directory Of Radio Writers As WPA Project

PORTLAND, (Sp.)—Adeline Willis field worker for the American Guide, a WPA writers' project, has just completed the first Oregon directory of all types of radio service in the state. The directory not only lists commercial stations and the type of programs they broadcast, but includes such items as the station's attitude toward liquor advertising, a list of radio editors, and newspaper-controlled stations.

In addition the directory lists radio beacons, short wave stations, radio navigational warnings, and the Radiomarine corporation's medical advice by radio. Other items include an analysis of quota distribution, and an Oregon census of radio homes as listed in the 1935 Broadcasting yearbook.

CANADA TO TRY CCC TYPE CAMP FOR YOUNG MEN

OTTAWA, Ont. (UP)—A new and brighter era is about to open for unemployed youth in Canada.

After three years of anomalous existence in the unfriendly atmosphere of relief camps, they are to be sent to training centers patterned along the lines of the conservation camps in the United States.

The present camps where 20,000 youths are earning 20 cents a day and their "keep" with a pick and shovel, will be abolished. The camps were established in 1932 to care for unemployed youths from urban centers, but have never been popular, and were the scene of many disturbances allegedly instigated by communist agitators.

Decision to replace them by training centers was reached at the inter-provincial conference held here last month. The conference unanimously adopted a resolution presented by David Croft, Ontario's labor-welfare minister, urging the dominion government to "devise a system for training youths in habits and techniques of work and industry, and for a thorough and widely integrated apprenticeship system."

Adoption of such a system will mark a new departure in treatment of unemployed youths in Canada. The dominion department of labor has been studying closely the CCC camps in the United States and will likely pattern Canada's new camps after them.

The new camps will be centers of vocational training and education, and the men will be paid a regular wage, from which they will pay board and lodging and buy their own clothes. Under the present system, youths receive 20 cents a day and food, lodging and clothing.

A number of the proposed camps will be for youths only. Others will take care of older unemployed men. The various departments of education in the provinces will cooperate in providing education for the men. It is hoped the new camps will check the drifting of youths from province to province—one of the major difficulties encountered under the present system. Men come and go as circumstances change, but under the new plan the unemployment will stay in one place for a definite period.

The whole purpose behind the project is training of the youths' minds and bodies to prepare them for jobs whenever work becomes available.

\$650,000,000 FUND SET FOR BRITISH RAILS AND ROADS

LONDON—(UP)—The British government has embarked on an ambitious \$650,000,000 program to improve the nation's railroads and highways during the next five years.

The highway building scheme, contemplating a cost of about \$500,000,000, was announced by Chancellor of the Exchequer Neville Chamberlain and was followed by disclosure of plans to "revitalize" the railroads at an expenditure of \$150,000,000.

The road improvements, benefiting every section of Britain, and providing jobs for thousands of the nation's 3,000,000 unemployed, will be carried out on a fifty-fifty basis, with the local communities raising \$250,000,000. Direct government grants will match the local funds.

"Improved national finances have made this scheme possible," Chamberlain said, pointing out that four years ago the government was forced to make drastic reductions in its highway allotments.

The railroad plan includes the electrification of hundreds of miles of track, new stations, automatic train controls and general modernization of equipment.

The work will be done principally on the routes of Britain's "Big Four" systems—Great Western railway; London, Midland and Scottish; London and North Eastern, and Southern railway.

The government, after months of negotiation, recently concluded an agreement with the "Big Four," which, as soon as enabling legislation is enacted by parliament, will permit an immediate start of operations.

So far as is practicable, all equipment for plants, machinery and materials will be given to firms in economically distressed areas.
