

Fans Pick Cowboy Grapppler to Subdue Mean Arkansan Tonight

CHICK, HOLLIS GO HEADLINES CARD; SEAT SALE BRISK

That long-awaited occasion—when Ken Hollis, Arkansas hoodlum and all around bad man, climbs into the ring against an opponent who is expected to give him a sound thrashing, arrives tonight. The main event between Hollis and Dude Chick, big ex-cowpuncher, has aroused more interest than any recent bouts, and duets for the fray at the Armory tonight are going fast. Promoter Mack Lillard said today.

The Chick-Hollis go will see science and an amazing repertoire of holds pitted against the Arkansas terror's slashing, slugging unorthodox attack. Master of the airplane scissor, the flying shoulder butt, the step-over shoulder bar, the intricate spider web hold and the airplane spin, it is believed that Chick will have the edge over Hollis tonight. Hollis is not willing to admit this, and today reiterated earlier statements that he will break Chick's string of four straight wins in this city.

The middle main event on the three-star card sees Bob Kennaston of Gold Hill matched against Frank Taylor, big and handsome collegiate from Ohio state. Kennaston dropped a wild match with Chick last week when he was ruled out on a foul, and is anxious to take tonight's bout before starting on a California barn-storming tour. Taylor has not lost in three starts here, and his effective southpaw haymaker which he uses to calm over-zealous meemies has become an expected feature of his performance.

The opening bout will be an all-fighter affair, with Tiger Taskoff, battling Bulgarian, matched against Max Glover of Detroit. The match will be the second here for Glover, who last week rough-housed his way to a defeat at Taylor's hands. A fast and punishing wrestler, Glover is considered the ideal foil for Taskoff's wild offensive tactics.

The first two matches will be under the Australian system of six 10-minute rounds. The final bout will be under the American rules of two out of three falls, or one hour of wrestling.

Admission prices for the affair have been radically reduced, in keeping with the new policy just established by promoter Lillard. The first match is scheduled to start at 8:30.

STANFORD AND U. S. C. SHARE SOUTH DIVISION BASKETBALL LAURELS

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3.—(AP)—The California Bears, their hopes high after routing Stanford in Friday night's game, eyed eagerly games with U. S. C. next week-end as the lead in the southern division, Pacific coast basketball conference, appeared in reach of the Trojans, Stanford's Indiana or both.

California's unexpected victory—which kept alive the Bears' 14 year old jinx over Stanford basketball teams—forced the favored Indiana to share the southern division lead with Southern California which had little trouble Saturday night in defeating U. C. L. A.

The once threatening Bruins were pushed far into the cellar with their 93-24 loss to U. S. C. U. C. L. A. has five losses and one victory.

California defeated Stanford 39-35. Friday and Saturday nights the Bears will attempt to climb into second place standing in a series with U. S. C. at Berkeley, while at Los Angeles Stanford takes on U. C. L. A. in a two game series.

FIVE CAGE TEAMS SHOW STRENGTH IN WEEK-END SCORES

Salem, Klamath Falls, Hood River and Franklin High Turn in Victories — Ashland Defeats U. High

Bristling basketball battles over the state the past week reflected the strength of Salem, Corvallis, Klamath Falls, Hood River and Franklin high of Portland teams.

Salem, which will be in the state tournament as host team, hit a fast pace and defeated the strong Tillamook high team 40 to 26.

Corvallis high defeated Eugene high 33 to 18 to gain leadership in the district 7 conference, and then thumped Lebanon 50 to 7 for good measure.

Klamath Trims Bend
After a mediocre non-conference season, Klamath Falls high swung into conference play by defeating Bend twice by scores of 28 to 22, and 23 to 22.

Hood River, which defeated The Dalles decisively last week, trimmed Milton-Freewater 36 to 16.

Franklin high, which has one of the tallest prep basketball teams ever assembled in Oregon, gained undisputed leadership of the Portland league by defeating Commerce 28 to 23. Coach Chappie King's kolossals, who average six feet two and a half inches, have out-driven and out-passed every Portland team they have played. The speedy giants are improving steadily.

Commerce, Benson and Washington are tied for second place in the Portland league with three wins and one loss each.

Medford Drops Grants Pass
Coach Bill Bowerman's Medford high Tigers retained a chance to tie for the southern Oregon conference championship by defeating Grants Pass 35 to 25, and 22 to 21 in hotly fought games. Ashland, which heads the league, hopped up to Eugene and nosed out University high 22 to 20.

Pendleton high showed improved form by defeating La Grande 24 to 22 and giving the Oregon State Bears a big scare before losing out 36 to 22.

A 26 to 16 win over West Linn placed Silverton into a tie for leadership of the Willamette valley league.

FANDOM AT RANDOM

The fact that Stanford's Hank Luisetti, during the course of a recent basketball game, ran up a total of 30 points all by his lonesome, has inspired sports writers all along the coast to award Hank the grandeur for high scoring honors for all time.

This scoring of laurels that rightly belong to a prominent Medford physician, so agitated Horace Bromley of this city that he has written to the sports editors of the Oregon Journal and the Oregonian in Portland, pointing out a few of the records established by Dr. E. W. Durno while he was frolicking on the boards at Oregon.

Mr. Bromley doesn't reveal what dusty archives he plundered for the wealth of staggering Durno records, but his job is so complete that it leaves one with the feeling that he should go to the doctor's office and take off his hat just by way of homage.

The letter is quoted herewith: To the Sporting Editor, Oregon Daily Journal, Portland, Oregon.

In looking over today's Sports Section of the Journal, I was surprised to find in the "Tower Light" column, credit given to "Hank" Luisetti of Stanford for establishing a Pacific Coast conference record for individual scoring. We basketball fans of Medford feel inclined to challenge that record, good as it may be, in behalf of a former University of Oregon star who is now a prominent resident of this city. I refer to Dr. Edwin R. Durno—"Eddie" Durno to you—who was all-coast forward for three years and who is still remembered as one of the outstanding basketball players of the Pacific coast.

Here's where we feel that the individual scoring record should remain in good old Oregon rather than California. On February 20, 1919, while playing forward on the University of Oregon's coast championship team, Durno scored 35 points (10 field goals and 15 free throws) in a game with Washington State College. The preceding night he annexed 26 points with 8 field goals and 10 free throws, making a total of 61 points for the two games. Moreover, this series was not played on the home court, but at Pullman, Washington. In reviewing the scores of these games, we find that Durno won the first one 38 to 28 and the second 43 to 27 which means that Durno scored 61 points out of the total of 81 made by the Oregon champs, which is some record in itself!

Now, to challenge another record mentioned in the same column that of Bobby Galer of Washington, who scored 176 points in 16 games. An excellent record, indeed, but once again we rise to defend Oregon's honor with the following facts and figures—in 1919, Eddie Durno scored a total of 244 points in 15 games, an average of 16.26 points per game as compared with Galer's average of 11 points. BEAVER QUINTET HOPES TO HALT HUSKIES' DRIVE

SEATTLE, Feb. 3.—(AP)—With the University of Washington Huskies still on a victory rampage, Oregon State College's Beavers will take over the job at Corvallis tonight of attempting to make the northern division Pacific coast conference basketball race more than a one-team affair.

The Huskies continued their victory march at the expense of Oregon's Webfooters last week-end, walking away with a long-sided 42-23 decision Friday and top-kicked a 35-31 win Saturday, marking up their fifth and sixth straight victories in the league record books.

The series ended the season's play between the two teams, with the Huskies making a "grand slam" of the four contests.

Oregon State, although the underdogs in tonight's battle, were in a nice spot to dump over the Husky apple-cart. A double win for the Beavers on their own floor would shove them up a half-game ahead of Washington in the standings.

At Pullman Saturday night, Idaho's six-times defeated Vandals upset the dope and hauled Washington State down a notch closer to the cellar with a 33-30 win.

In addition to the Husky-Beaver series, other conference tussles this week will see the Cougars and Vandals renew hostilities, meeting at Moscow Friday and jumping to Pullman for another argument Saturday, and the two Oregon teams battling at Corvallis Saturday.
