A tenderly beautiful story filled with pathos was brought before a large audience at the city hall at Talent Saturday evening when the Grange there presented "Just Debts."

The plot hinged on the problems of the village city council in disposal of a bequest. Ben Webster, George Hartley, and Tom Bell playing the roles of the self-centered and greedy councilmen in a very effective manner. Wanda Works in her huge gray shawl and tattered shoes splendidly portrayed the pathetic role of Mrs. Lane, benevolent soul forced to abandon her meagre home with its jays and pet crows for the poor farm.

Leta Miller, as Mrs. Bailey, kindly matron of the village, regarded as a refuge to all burdened with troubles, soon the sympathy of her audience with her courage and straightforward statements exposing the characters of the councilmen and swinging the play to a desirable climax.

The play was presented under the competent direction of Mrs. Harriet Bates. Selections by the Talent orchestra during the evening were greatly appreciated, as were a number of songs by a male quartet from Ashland composed of Bert Miller, Harry Voe, Dr. Tilton, and Reverend Norse.

ARMY AIR BASE SELECTIONS DUE IN MONTH, BELIEF

The committee now considering the choice of sites for the several new air bases should report by the end of another month, Major General Oscar Westover, chief of air corps of the U. S. army, told a delegation of Medford citizens this morning.

Staying here for half an hour while ice was knocked from the wings of his ship, General Westover stated that he had nothing to do with the selection of sites for the bases. He indicated that his department is represented on the board that is now considering the matter, but stated that he had no say in the matter personally.

"We don't know when the board will report back," Westover said, adding "But if they expect to get it considered by this congress they'll have to get it in before another month, and I feel that they will." With a twinkle in his eye, the General said, "That'll give congress a couple of months to monkey around with it."

The Medford citizens at the auditions to greet the high army official were all interested in the matter of the choice of sites for the new bases. This city has made a bid for consideration for one of the posts, but Westover gave no inkling as to the probability of the city's being considered.

Those present were Fred Scheffel, city superintendent, A. H. Banwell, manager of the chamber of commerce, and Floyd Hart and Fred Heath, Jr., of the chamber's committee on aeronautics. George H. Owens, commander of the Medford CCG district, and Lieut. Roy Craft, public relations officer, were also present.

BAD CHECK CASE BELIEVED CLEARED

Ralph E. Glem, 20, local youth, is held in the county jail, charged with forgery, to await action of the grand jury. The district attorney's office said today the arrest cleared up the case of "mistaken identity" that has clouded bad check operations in this city for the past fortnight, and involving Dick C. Peterson.

Peterson was charged with the uttering of spurious checks, and two complaints against him were dismissed in justice court. Witnesses failed to make complete identification. Peterson also presented an iron-clad alibi and his employer vouched for his honesty, stating that he had handled as high as \$2000 of his money, at times.

Glem, arrested last Saturday, waived a preliminary hearing in justice court. He is specifically charged with uttering and passing of a bogus check for \$12.85 upon Mrs. M. M. Colby, proprietress of the Laurel Street Grocery.

NEWBURY SUES ON AUTO COLLISION

Attorney Gus Newbury has filed suit in circuit court against Marie Collins and Kate Wright for \$6,001, for alleged injuries and damages sustained in an auto accident on the Pacific highway, three miles north of Central Point, in the late afternoon of December 3 last.

The complaint lists Kate Wright as driver and Marie Collins as owner of the auto which is alleged to have crashed head-on into the auto driven by Newbury. Negligence and recklessness is charged in the driving of the Wright auto.

The accident occurred at the intersection of the Pacific highway with the William Penninger lane, and it is further alleged that the driver of the Wright machine failed to stop before entering an arterial highway.

Attorney Newbury charges that as a result of the accident he sustained injury to his legs, chest, shoulder, back and nose.

General damages in the sum of \$5000 are sought with \$1000 for loss of business, by reason of being confined to his bed and \$31 for medical attention.

DONNA A. GRAFFIS OF PHOENIX DIES

Donna A. Graffis, well-known pioneer and native of Jackson county, passed away at a local hospital late Saturday evening at the age of 72.

She was born at Phoenix, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Purry, early pioneers of that locality, and had lived practically all her life in Jackson county. She was married at the home of her parents in 1862 to John Graffis, who died in 1919.

Mrs. Graffis was a long-time member of the Presbyterian church of Phoenix and took an active part. She was also a member of the Phoenix Grange, besides her sister, Edmunda Anderson, she leaves many nieces and nephews throughout the country.

Funeral services will be held under direction of Conger funeral parlors at 2:30 Wednesday at the Presbyterian church in Phoenix, with the Rev. Ralph Peterson officiating. Interment will be made in the Furry plot in the Phoenix cemetery.

STATE TROOPERS BUSY IN JANUARY

BALEM, Feb. 2.—(AP)—State troopers arrested 30 persons last month for operating their automobiles while intoxicated. Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, reported today. Forty others were arrested for reckless driving.

Police arrested a total of 590 persons for traffic violations, resulting in fines of \$5,281.90.

There were 213 arrests in the general law enforcement division, bringing \$1,340.63 in fines. Twelve of those were held for other law enforcement agencies.

The fish and game law division reported 71 arrests and fines totaling \$2,912.

Police investigated 344 complaints last month, of which 115 were cleared.

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SNOW OR RAIN IS VALLEY FORECAST

Snow or rain tonight and tomorrow was predicted today by the weather bureau. Not much change in temperatures was expected.

A light snow fell in the valley early this morning but the flakes melted as fast as they landed.

Light and intermittent snow flurries were noted in Crater Lake national park and on the Siskiyou and Seston summits during the day.
