NEUTRALITY TOPIC OF NAVY OFFICER AT ROTARY LUNCH

Itself may be at stake in case of another general war. It is the development of great air forces that has added much to the tension in Europe and Asia today, he said. "Areas have now taken the place of fronts in present-day warfare."

The speaker emphasized the fact that this country, in case of war in other parts of the world, would suffer as a neutral almost as much as if we were actively engaged. Any neutrality legislation should avoid a premium on aggression, he said, and organized economic power through international cooperation was given as the probable solution to the problem of maintaining peace.
