



### HUSKY CAGERS WIN FOURTH STRAIGHT FROM OREGONIANS

#### Staters Lose, 35 to 31 When Invaders Rally After Trailing 20-10 at Half Time — Paterson Stars

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 5.—(AP)—The University of Washington basketball team left for Seattle today, taking with it four consecutive victories over Oregon's two major schools and every prospect for retaining its position as leader of the Pacific coast conference's northern division.

The Huskies last night defeated Oregon State, defending northern division champions, by virtue of a dazzling last-half attack after trailing, 20 to 10, at mid-game.

The victory was the Huskies' eighth in conference play this season. Its Oregon invasion also resulted in another win, 31 to 29, over the Oregon State five, and two victories, 42 to 33 and 35 to 31, over the University of Oregon at Eugene.

Hunt Paterson, playing only the last 18 minutes of last night's game, started the rally which gave the Huskies the lead and caged one of the two goals which provided the final four-point margin. He was high scorer with 10 points.

The Staters at the last minute switched to a man-to-man defense and had the northerners baffled a good share of the way until Paterson started the fireworks.

The mad trip ended the first half of the season for the leaders. Four games with Idaho and two each with Washington State and Oregon State remain on the schedule.

Oregon State remains in second place in conference ranking.

### SCRAPPY INDIANS ALWAYS PROVIDE HOT COMPETITION

The colorful little Chemawa Indians, who file into the city Friday for a two-game basketball series against the Medford high school, occupy an unusual position in the esteem of Medford fans. Relations between the two schools have always been most cordial. Despite the fact that Chemawa's losses far out-balance their wins over the Tigers, they are still considered one of the showiest and scrappiest teams to play here.

Since 1931, when Darwin Burgher first took over the reins, the teams have clashed every year but one for a two-game series. Previous to that time, Medford and Chemawa had played nearly every year since 1927. Since 1931, Medford won six games, with the Indians nabbing only two.

In the first game of the series, the Tigers romped over the warriors, 34-14, but on the next night scraped out a thin 18-17 victory in a game that was typical of the hot basketball battles the two teams usually have.

Using a short, overhead pass, the Indians nearly broke away several times, but had miserable luck with their shots.

The same choppy passing attack will probably be used again in this series, and Coach Bowerman's Medford team was scheduled to scrimmage against the Iue Raiders tonight, with the Raiders doing their best to imitate the Indian offensive moves.

An in-and-out squad, the Chemawa lads have been surprising all year, taking tough games by convincing margins, only to drop their next weather till by an equally convincing vote.

The Tigers worked out again last night on their driving, rushing offense, which they will throw against the Redskins in an effort to wear them down before the end of the game.

### FANDOM AT RANDOM

That phenomenal Washington basketball team, which is apparently invincible, would have to come along just when it looked as though Howard Hobson was going to have one of the best teams in late years at Oregon. Hobby does have a basketball team that is potentially great. All of the men are clever ball handlers, alert on defense and good shots. But pitted against Washington they seem almost helpless.

It's too far away from here to be able to judge accurately, but a few Medford people who have seen Oregon play say that there is internal strife on the squad. It isn't apparent on the floor, but is in the locker room, they say. With the fusion of two strong teams such as the SONS squad Hobson took north with him and the Oregon team from last year, strife is not surprising.

If the charge is true, it will probably be remedied in the next few weeks. Oregon has everything to win and nothing to lose from now on, and Hobby is too smart a lad to have any revolutionists on the squad.

Chuck Taylor, the basketball star who lectured here and in Ashland Monday, confirms the opinion of hundreds of Oregonians that they play a better brand of basketball in the northwest than they do in California. In 1934 Washington, leaders of the northern division, took two games to one from Southern Cal in the final. Last year, in an exciting finish, Southern Cal edged out Oregon State in the finals.

"Southern Cal had no right to take that series" is the way Taylor gets around to the fact that Southern Cal did just that. The reason he gives for the superiority of the northern division is: Better condition, due to the fact that in Oregon and Washington the weather during basketball season keeps most would-be athletes, indoors, where they have nothing much to do except play basketball. The nights are cold and the players spend less time running around and the cold air is more conducive to action.

Another possible reason, although Taylor himself didn't mention it, is the fact that northerners lose their shirt every time they play California football teams, and basketball offers a balm to wounded feelings.

While browsing through the American Bowling Congress "Bulletin," we came across the following set of "rules" for the game. After listening to a few games at the Smoke House Bowl we are quite aware that a few already know the rules. Others may be interested in learning them. Here they are:

For Greater Popularity.

Dash into the alleys two minutes before starting time when it's an important match. This soothes your teammates' nerves.

Test the sliding qualities of each runway three or four times before each pitch. This always proves you are an expert.

Wait until your opponent is ready to roll before going after your ball. He will surely want to kiss you if you do this often enough.

If the pitch isn't coming up fast enough, dash across the next three alleys, using either a body check or rolling block upon anyone in your path. This is a sure dividend payer in time.

When the ball is headed for the pocket, start backing away from the foul line, slowly at first, gradually increasing speed until at the moment of impact you land in somebody's lap.

After delivering the ball, stand at the foul line. Whirl sharply just as your opponent arrives at the mark, or, better still, edge over slightly onto his runway. Do this often enough and you need have no worries about old-age pensions.

Pick up all cigarettes you happen to see parked on the scoreboard or return loop. This cuts down the expense of the game considerably.

Carefully examine your thumb after every roll. If you miss the spare, glare at the pin-boy and tell him to keep his greasy fingers out of the holes.

Give the foul judge an argument if your light goes on. He probably has something against your Aunt Ella and is taking spite out on you.

At every opportunity, explain in great detail about the time you "struck out and won by one pin." If your audience seems unappreciative, tell them about the split you picked up last week. Nobody but you has ever had those experiences.

Do this all season—and you'll be in another league next year.
