Jackson county is now in line to receive its Oregon-California tax refund money, aggregating close to \$82,000, according to word received by the county court from Senator Steiwer at Washington, D. C.

A bill is now before congress providing for the full amount. The original claim was for approximately \$82,000, or 60 per cent of the claim.

The bill provides for the payment of the additional 40 per cent.

The Jackson county claim, when filed last spring, was misplaced at Washington, D. C., causing delay in the payment to this county.

All other O-C counties have received their allotment.

The O-C payment when received will be allotted to the various funds of the county.
