SALES TAX AIDS IN WASHINGTON

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 5.—(UP)—Receipts of Washington's 1935 revenue act, which became effective May 1, exceeded \$120,000,000 up to February 1, more than the most optimistic estimates. State Treasurer Otto A. Case reported today.

Improved business conditions were credited with the increase in returns. Principal revenue source was the two per cent general sales tax.

Case said that \$9,938,516 had been paid into the general school fund, \$2,139,890 to relief, \$2,260,285 to the state general fund, \$411,496 to University of Washington, \$32,849 to Washington State college, \$13,425 to Bellingham normal, \$5,335 to Cheney normal, \$33,204 to Ellensburg normal.

Oregonian Marks 75th Anniversary

PORTLAND, Feb. 5.—(AP)—The Oregonian celebrated its 75th birthday as a daily newspaper Tuesday.

Oregon was two years old when Volume 1, Number 1 of the new daily was issued on the morning of Monday, February 4, 1861. The paper had been founded as a weekly in 1859.

The first edition of the daily, five columns wide, carried two columns of advertising on the first page. One general store advertised a wide range of equipment, from ox-yokes to "self-acting cheese-presses."

Slaying of Loeb Spurs Pen Probe

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 5.—(AP)—Governor Henry Horner offered a free rein today to a commission of 16 he invited to investigate a general prison condition as his answer to charges of lax prison administration which followed the violent death of Richard Loeb in Stateville pentagon last week ago.

Widely known experts from many walks of life were asked to reply immediately that the inquiry might start promptly.

Mrs. Roosevelt Not Campaigning

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt told her press conference today she will not make campaign speeches.

"I am not making any campaign speeches," she said. "All the speeches that I make are made on a non-partisan basis, so far as that is possible."

WASHINGTON ADDS OLD AGE PENSIONS

OLYMPIA, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Washington state will receive more than \$600,000 from the federal deficiency bill to expand its old age pension, to dependent children and blind pension programs, Charles F. Ernst, director of the public welfare, said today.

The money will be given to the state for welfare needs from February 1 to June 30, Ernst said.

The old age pension fund will receive \$312,500 from the government, which will pay half the cost. The number of pensions will be increased within the next few weeks. The names of those to be added to the rolls will be drawn from the 43,000 applicants now in file.

About \$215,000 of the federal money will be used for aid to dependent children. The counties will pay \$250,000 for the five-month period and the state \$400,000.
