SAM EGGER, PIONEER RESIDENT HERE, DIES AT DAUGHTER'S HOME

Sam Egger, resident of Josephine and Jackson counties since 1878, died at 7:45 last night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. James E. Sowell, 604 Beatty street. He was in his 90th year.

Funeral service, in charge of Congregational parson, are to be announced later.
 Mr. Egger was born October 14, 1846, in Switzerland. He came to the United States in 1858 to live with an uncle in Philadelphia. In June, 1878, he arrived in southern Oregon where he continued to reside until his death. Most of the time he lived in Josephine county near the old town of Waldo. For the past three years he made his home with his daughter here.

On September 1, 1880, Mr. Egger married Elizabeth Jane Fehey in Jacksonville. Six children were born of the union. Surviving are Mrs. Sowell, three sons, 11 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. One son, John L. Egger, resides in Grants Pass.
