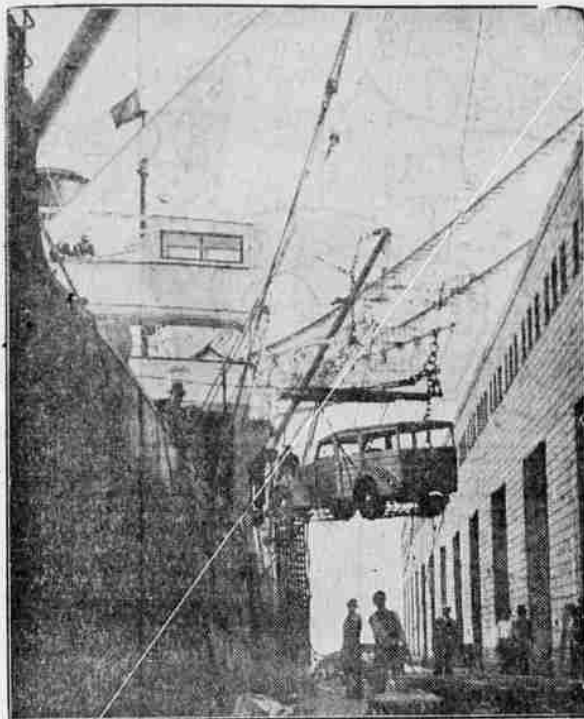
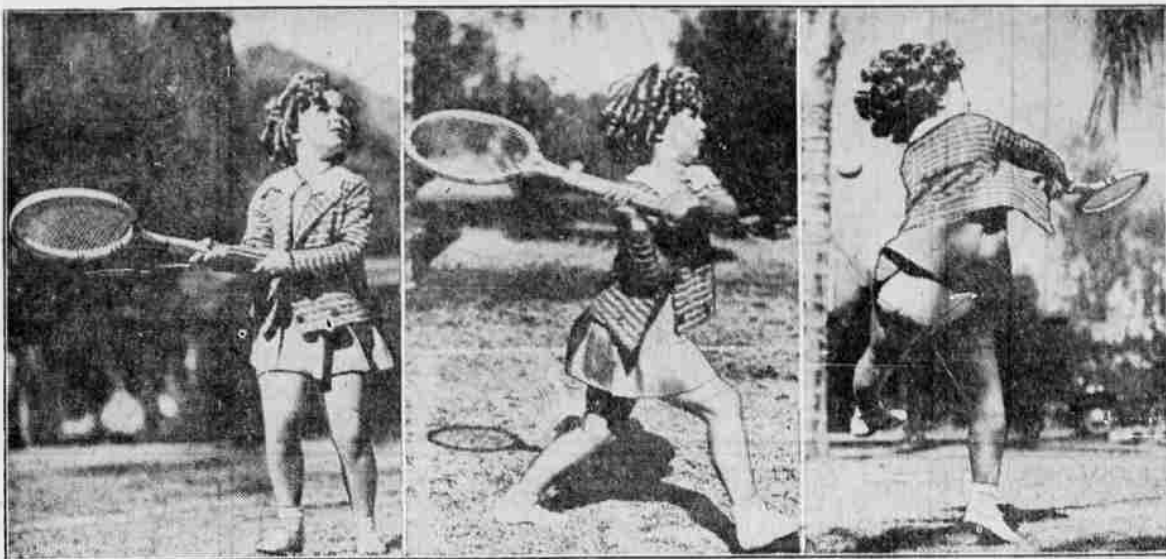


STATION WAGON FOR CLIPPER

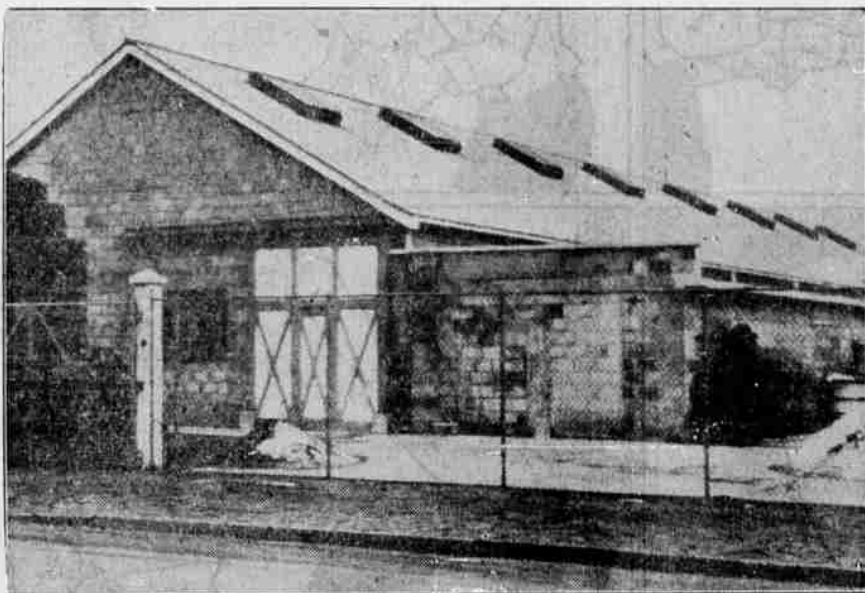

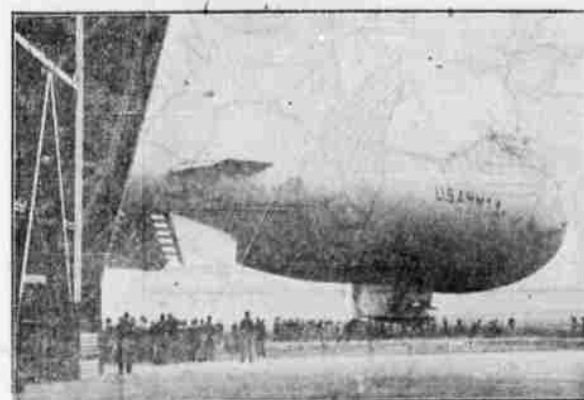
