(Continued from Page One) the kindly old cream puff orators would make him. He would say to the supreme court, "You are not marshals to enforce your split decisions and I'll call out the army and navy to enforce the will of the people." Senator Couzens (R. Mich.): "Times are too different. It's hard to say what a Lincoln of the present day would do." Senator Clark (D. Mo.): "Lincoln criticized the court's decision in the Dred Scott case but he did not question its constitutionality. No doubt he would meet the problems of today with the same courage he met those of his day." Senator Johnson (R. Cal.): "He would be the first to go to the relief of the hungry, the needy and the suffering." Senator Pope (R. Idaho): "He overturned one decision of the supreme court with a civil war, and I doubt if he would permit legal concepts to stand in the way of humanitarian progress in a war against depression." Representative Wadsworth (R. N. Y.): "No matter how different Lincoln might find the present day from his own, whatever he did he would not be lacking in character." Representative Sumners (D. Tex.): "Lincoln would recognize the fact that with our frequent five-four decisions one human being on the supreme court determines what is the constitution." Senator Logan (D. Ky.): "He would be in favor of all social legislation, for if ever there was a man whose heart was with the people it was Lincoln." Senator Hastings (R. Del.): "I couldn't answer that right off, now could I?" Senator Norris (R. Neb.): "Lincoln would be like me, he wouldn't know what the hell to do!" Vice-President Garner (D. Tex.): "Now you leave me out of this."
