HELPED HER BURN BODY OF HUSBAND, BROTHER CLAIMS

last May 21 early this week, has been in custody of the jail matron since that time.

Work at the pit in which the fragments of bones were found was resumed this morning, the sheriff said. The bones were possibly those of a human being's fingers and knuckles, he said.

Barton also charged his sister had tried to poison Sandell before the killing, but had been unsuccessful.

In his signed statement, Barton, 50, said his sister came north from San Francisco last April and that her former husband followed her about three weeks later. Barton went to his brother's home near Stanwood.

"On my return, she said she had got to do something about Sandell. He had threatened her with a gun, she said.

"She asked me to buy a gun. I went to Bremerton and bought a .38 calibre revolver and a box of shells."

Gave Him Poison. A few days previous to the killing, she put poison, one of three kinds she had obtained, in a powdered extract drink and gave it to Sandell, Barton said. He was violently sick.

"On May 21, she found him near the woods watching some squirrels," the sheriff quoted Barton's statement as saying. "She came up behind him, and shot him in the back."

"He fell on his side into a stump hole. We covered him with some brush and set fire to it and burned the body."

Joshua Barton, the sheriff said, disclosed he had taken the gun to Stanwood last week-end and hid it in a trunk. State Patrolman Ted Cole was to go there today.

Mrs. Sandell's account of the slaying was that Barton and her former husband quarreled while they were clearing land and that Barton shot him, tossed his body on a stump pile and burned it. He threatened her if she should ever tell, but recently she went to a neighbor, who advised her to go to the sheriff's office.

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OREGON LIQUOR SALES GROWING AT RAPID RATE

merchandise losses or shortages to gross sales is 125.

"During the year 1935 the merchandise losses and shortages amounted to the sum of \$2,351.82, and during that period the total sales amounted to the sum of \$6,036,163.74 and the percentage of losses to gross sales is 38.88.

\$6,310 Shortage Total

"For the entire period from the time of the inception of the Oregon liquor control commission to December 31, 1935, the shortages amounted to the aggregate sum of \$6,310.87, and during that period of time the total sales were \$9,210,672.04 and the percentage of shortages to gross sales is 68.85.

"Agency inventory shortages under \$10 are carried on retail control ledger as unadjusted balances and are not collected currently from agents except from agency transfers or discontinuance of agency. The net total of such shortages as of December 31, 1935, aggregate only \$69.85.

"All inventory shortages over \$10, determined by state audits, are collected currently.

"As of December 31, 1935, total shortages per state audits outstanding amounted to only \$69.80.

"The cash losses from state operations from the inception of this commission to December 31, 1934, were \$234.58. For the year ending December 31, 1935, the cash losses were only \$201.89, with twice the volume of business as in the preceding year.

"In the license and revenue division this department of the commission made total collections from the inception of the commission to December 31, 1935, in the sum of \$1,211,796.85, with a loss of only \$125.
