Superintendent Howard has furnished all districts with the new courses in health and physical education work. Standardization of high schools is an important matter now that the non-high school district law is in operation to make contracts for tuition with high schools not standard. Inspections are carried out periodically under supervision of Dr. Howard in order that high schools may be kept up to standard and notified when necessary additions and changes are to be made in the interest of standardization.

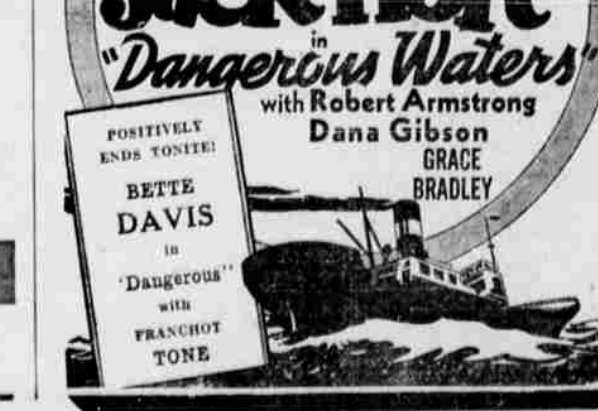

torch-light parade during the night to their headquarters at Braschi palace, where they were addressed by Vecchio Orati, Rome secretary of the party.

ADDIS ABABA, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Ethiopian War Minister Ras Mulugheta telegraphed to the government today a denial of Italian claims of a victory south of Makale on the northern front.

Ras Mulugheta said there were several patrol skirmishes last week in which the Italians lost 31 killed and 73 wounded.

A government communique, describing the Italian claims of a victory south of Makale, and an advance of 16 miles to Amba Aradam as absurd and impossible, probably will be issued tomorrow, authoritative sources said.

Marius Brophill, Irish Red Cross representative who returned recently from the north, was summoned to the palace where he signed a statement to be published soon, designed to show the Italian claims unreasonable.
