

CONGRESS GIRDS FOR FIGHT OVER TAXES, SPENDING

\$440,000,000 farm program from taxes similar to the old AAA processing levies invalidated by the supreme court.

Taxes and relief were considered the only remaining major legislation likely to raise a storm in congress—but some legislators figured that storm might be terrific.

Moving carefully, President Roosevelt has not announced a recommendation on either problem. Uncertainty still surrounded the administration tax program after an inconclusive White House conference yesterday.

Suggestions Drafted

Experts of the treasury and agriculture department have drafted tentative suggestions for \$900,000,000 in levies to finance the farm program and some of the bonus cost, but the White House has not yet passed on the proposals, so far as is known. The suggestions include levies on processors and some revisions in income tax exemptions.

Senator LaFollette's bill, however, would be more sweeping. He said he would offer, if the administration did not, an income tax schedule similar to one he proposed last year.

Residence raising taxes on the rich, it would lower the exemption for married couples from \$2,500 to \$2,000 and for single individuals from \$1,000 to \$500.

Would Jump Tax Rate

It would also jump the normal tax rate from four to six per cent and start the surtax on incomes of \$3,000.

Last year the LaFollette plan was estimated to yield about \$250,000,000, but its friends believe that with the improvement in business since then the revenue would be much larger.

Others in the independent group, both Republicans and Democrats, were ready to join LaFollette in opposing processing taxes, or similar levies. They contended these were really sales taxes which drew more revenue from the poor than the rich.

On the other hand, many members of congress contended that little additional revenue would be raised by increasing taxes on the rich, and that any substantial new government income must come from the "rank and file."

Fortunes To Melt

One congressional tax authority figured out a theoretical case to show that under present income and estate tax rates the accumulation of huge fortunes is no longer possible, and even those already in existence will eventually be broken up.

He took as an example a man with a \$100,000,000 fortune. When that man dies, he said, his tax will be \$87,382,500, leaving an estate of \$12,617,500 to be passed on.

If it all goes to a single son, who earns an average of 10 per cent a year, his annual income will be \$1,261,750. Out of that he will have to pay an income tax of \$2,434,711. This will leave him \$829,029 a year.

Assuming that he lives on \$50,000 a year, which the tax authority held would be unlikely, he would add \$15,000,000 to his fortune in twenty-five years. He would then die with \$48,000,000. The tax would be \$31,000,000, and the one-time fortune of \$100,000,000 would be down to \$17,000,000.

Many on Relief

Of the 3,707,770 persons in work relief jobs, the works progress administration is employing 2,888,399.

Commenting on the fact that the job total is now beyond 3,500,000, WPA officials said that in setting up this figure as a goal, the administration meant it to be an average, not a maximum. They said they had expected the winter to show an increase.

However, informed circles said the report would make it more difficult to hold the new relief appropriation for the fiscal year beginning next July 1 to less than \$2,000,000,000.

Already, because of the slowness of other agencies in getting their projects started during cold weather, WPA has begun to scrape the bottom of its financial barrel and has started looking around for another \$200,000,000 to keep going until June 30.

Robert W. Sawyer, Bend member of the commission, said the board is not delaying action and that there have been no postponements. "We are trying hard to get things started," he said.

During the afternoon the members of the board studied a 40-page outline of plans that should be included in the capitol construction work. The report was confidential. The commissioners also discussed the proposed \$450,000 heating and lighting plant that has been suggested for state buildings at Salem. As a PWA project, this proposal is pending. The commission suggested that, if approval is forthcoming, this plant might be used, also, to heat and light the new statehouse.

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LEIBOWITZ INFERS BELIEF IN GUILT OF ACCUSED MAN

from the case in an announcement indicating he believed the condemned man was guilty.

"Hauptmann understands very clearly that his last card has been played and he has lost," Leibowitz said.

Leibowitz and Fisher told Hauptmann, according to a reliable source, that there was no new evidence and Gov. Harold G. Hoffman had told them he would not grant Hauptmann another reprieve.

"The scene in the deathhouse was worse than anything I have ever seen in any electrocution chamber," this source said. "Leibowitz and Fisher were deeply affected."

"Leibowitz did most of the questioning and never raised his voice above a conversational tone. It had a hypnotic effect on the prisoner."

"There was no bulldozing but Hauptmann frequently raised his voice."

Flaws Pointed Out.
"Leibowitz did not request Hauptmann to change his story, but in pointing out the numerous flaws in Hauptmann's defense, he gave the prisoner every opportunity to tell the truth if he had not already done so."

"Hauptmann said, 'dot handwriting is the worstest thing against me.'"

"He was inclined to dismiss all phases of the kidnap evidence against him with a shrug, remarking 'dot' no so."

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"He discussed more avidly, however, the extortion evidence, the handwriting and the money, but he did not change his story on them or any other phases of the case one bit."

"Leibowitz tore several sheets of paper into 100 pieces and asked Hauptmann to write numbers on three of them. Hauptmann wrote the numbers 2, 40 and 80 on three pieces and Leibowitz then mixed them with the others."

"He then asked Hauptmann to try to draw out of a hat the pieces on which he had written. Hauptmann drew out three blanks."

"That's how much chance there is of finding three persons in this county who would mispell the same words the same way," Leibowitz said."

Pleads for Return.
The source continued: "Just before the lawyers left, Hauptmann, who had lost and regained his composure repeatedly throughout the interview, appealed to Leibowitz to come back."

"Leibowitz did not say that he would."

"As the lawyers departed, Hauptmann peered after them. One wondered what his expression meant as the guards prepared to readjust the screen in his cell, shutting off his view of the retiring counsel."

"As the lawyers put on their coats and walked to the door of the death house, Leibowitz adjusted his tie, wiped his dripping forehead, and said to Fisher: 'Telling that man that he had to die was the hardest job I've ever done.'"

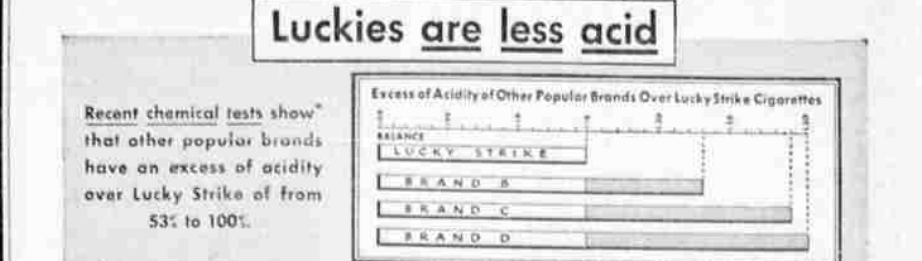
