

### APPLIGATE HORSE ROUNDUP TO HAVE COUNTY APPROVAL

#### Trap Will Be Built and Wild Band Driven in—Animals Will Be Sold at Auction — 75 to 100 in Group

Early authorization by the county court of a general roundup of the wild horses of the Little Applegate will be given, whereupon a "horse-trap" will be built and the indigent band driven into it, with the aid of cowboys and CCC enrollees, Lee Port, forest service ranger in charge of the district, said today.

A long V-shaped chute will lead to the corral, and the wild horses will be maneuvered into it. Twenty expert range riders and 100 CCC enrollees will be engaged in the drive, which is expected to take a couple of days.

Building of the corral and chute will start as soon as formal approval of the roundup is made by the county court, Port said.

Law Authorizes. District Attorney George Coddling said the roundup would be under the Oregon law, which provides that "neglected, abandoned and starting wild horses shall be rounded-up, under orders of the county court."

Once rounded up, horses are sold at public auction, after 10 days is allowed for any owner to claim his stock. The animals are sold to the highest bidder.

Officials stated the wild horses are of little value except for commercial fox farm feed, and that would undoubtedly be their ultimate fate.

Forest Ranger Port said none of the wild horses could be reclaimed for farm duties, as they were a low order of equine life, "wilder than wild, and meaner than mean, with an average weight of 600 pounds."

Some of the stallion leaders are fair specimens of horse flesh, but the majority are "scraggly and inbred" and afflicted with all the ills known to horses. None are "wind-broken," however, due to ranging over mountains and down canyons.

Live in Horse Heaven. Ranger Port said the range of the wild horses consisted of bald hills, and is a sort of "horse-heaven country," where there is not much snow, and easy grazing conditions.

"I figure the band has been in existence for 25 years, and numbers between 75 and 100 head," said Port.

"The band originally started when abandoned horses drifted up from the farms of the Rogue River valley. Through the years they increased, and were joined by stray horses from farms, from time to time."

Once a "good horse" joins the wild band, he becomes an equine vagabond, and is beyond redemption, Port stated.

Port described the wild horse band as "the worst kind of a general nuisance on the range."

Applegate stockmen seek the eradication of the wild horses, because they are trampling down grazing land, raising alfalfa patches, kicking young stock to death, and eating up the rock-salt left for sheep and cattle herds.

### Ghost Walks All Over Hollywood Trying to Get Rid of Paychecks

HOLLYWOOD — When the ghost walks in Hollywood, he takes a hike — literally. Pay-day means a stroll from stage to stage, from star dressing room to executive office, for the studio cashier.

The extras, bit players, carpenters, electricians and property men file by the cashier's barred window to collect their week's earnings, but the stars—in the majority of cases—get those fancy checks delivered. They do, that is, if they see them at all.

Most stars have agents who pop up, bright and early each pay-day, to collect their checks for them. The agent, with his 10 percent in mind, wastes no time in getting to the bank. He always bears with him a letter from the star, or a power of attorney, authorizing such collection. If he hasn't the studio cashier in most instances will not release the check.

Astaire Collects. Ginger Rogers is one star who never sees her pay-check. She has a manager who banks it for her, allowing her to draw her "allowance" against it. But Fred Astaire, says Harry Peale, RKO cashier, is always at his window bright and early Wednesday morning to collect in person.

Ann Harding likes to let her checks accumulate—sometimes as many as three or four weeks—and collect them wholesale. "Once she recalled," says Harry, "the days when she made \$30 a week and a pair of new stockings was a thrill. Now, she told me, she can buy a hundred pairs at once and never miss the cost—and it's not so exciting."

Here Comes Hepburn! Peale always knows when Katharine Hepburn is coming to collect. "You can hear her laughing and joking a block away—but she's mighty nice," he adds.
