GUSTY WIND RIPS OFF SIGNS; BLOWS POLE UPON AUTO

A gusty wind from the south tore through the Rogue valley Friday afternoon and evening, ripping small Medford signs from their cross-arms, uprooting trees and snapping off power-line poles.

The 60-foot flag pole in front of the W. I. Waver residence at 310 West Main street was snapped off at its base about 8:30 p.m. It crashed across a car parked on Holly street, striking the machine over the cowl.

The hood was damaged and the windshield and a window were smashed. The auto was owned by Charles E. Stella of 525 Pearl street. It was unoccupied at the time.

A sign at the A. B. Cully service station at West Main and Front streets was blown down, the wind ripping out its concrete base from the earth.

A large plate glass window in the northwest corner of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce was shattered, glass falling around the desk of A. H. Banwell, manager.

No reports of injuries were recorded. The weather bureau recorded a maximum wind velocity of 36 miles an hour at 8:40 p.m. and of 28 miles an hour at 8:30. Meteorologists, however, said the velocity in town was probably greater as the bureau at the airport is in a sheltered area.

Upon the United States' entry into the World War, Mr. Seaman was a member of the first enlisted company of militia leaving Ashland, and was a member of the Medford post, American Legion.

Besides his wife, he leaves two children, Patricia and Russell E. Seaman of Eagle Point and one brother, Chas. B. Seaman of Medford.
