

RE-ELECT SCHADE AREA PRESIDENT FOR BOY SCOUTS

Council Conference Most Successful in History Held Sunday—Plans Outlined for Coming Year.

At one of the most successful annual meetings in the history of Crater Lake Area council of the Boy Scouts held yesterday at the Hotel Medford, Larry Schade was re-elected president of the council for the fourth consecutive time. The nominating committee, headed by L. N. Lorensen, nominated three vice presidents for the first time in the history of the area. Those nominated were G. Howard Grover of Grants Pass; Lewis N. Lorensen of Mt. Shasta, California, and Dr. Walter Redford of the Southern Oregon Normal school in Ashland, who was also appointed chairman of the leadership and training committee. All were elected unanimously.

R. E. McElhose was re-elected commissioner and Eugene Thordike re-elected treasurer. President Schade made the following appointments for 1936: John Fuller, court of honor chairman; M. N. Hogan, civic service chairman; George Luttrell, chairman of the educational publicity committee; Eugene Thordike, head of the finance committee; Seth Bullis, chairman of the health and safety committee; W. J. Moyer, Grants Pass, chairman of the troop organization committee, and A. E. Angel, Weed, California, head of the new council committee on reading.

Regional Executive Edward L. Curtis of Portland was in charge of the business conference, which also included the reading of reports. Reports made included: court of honor for 1935, Judge J. Fuller; camping, L. D. Jones; civic service, M. N. Hogan; finance, Fred L. Heath, Sr.; health and safety, Seth Bullis; troop organization, Council Commissioner Richard E. McElhose; council treasurer, Eugene Thordike.

Group conferences were held throughout the afternoon, and plans outlined for the coming year. While these conferences were in session a group of about 40 ladies, here with their husbands from the entire area, were guests of George Hunt at the Craterian theatre.

Don Newbury was toastmaster at the banquet in the main dining room, attended by over 100 scouts. The council court of honor, with Judge John H. Fuller as chairman, made the coveted Eagle Scout award to Scout Jack Heyland, who with 22 merit badges instead of the necessary 21, was adjudged one of the best fitted for that honor in the history of local scouting. The presentation was made by President Schade. M. N. Hogan sponsored the Scout, who is a member of troop 2. Heyland's was the first Eagle presentation in six months in this area. The court presented an Eagle Mother's pin to Mrs. Heyland.

Dr. Redford delivered the main address of the day, "The Boy Scout Oath and Law As a Code of Ethics, a Mode of Living—Not Only For Boys, But For Adults."

At the meeting Irvin P. Beasley, new Crater Lake council executive, was introduced for the first time. Dinner music was furnished by a five-piece orchestra, which also accompanied Miss LaMerle Beck in several vocal numbers.

Flag presentation before and after the conference was made by Dick Roberts, five year veteran Eagle scout, assisted by a uniformed group of scouts who attended the national jamboree last year.

"printed and written record shows that he was lying." Hauptmann was informed of the governor's statement by his chief defense counsel, C. Lloyd Fisher. The lawyer said Hauptmann was greatly "encouraged" and given new hope he will escape the electric chair. He is under sentence to die March 30.

Fisher said he was waiting for the state to start a perjury action against Whitely and would make no move of his own at present.

inches of snow at park headquarters, 126 inches at Annie Spring. Park roads, closed yesterday because of a break in the snow plow, were reported open again today. State highways leading to the park were being kept open.

Flows at Work

It was snowing hard this morning on Sexton summit, the AAA reported. Sixteen inches of new snow were reported on the road to Oregon Caves, ten inches on Greenspring mountain and a similar amount on the Siskiyou. Flows were at work clearing the highways but the AAA advised all motorists to carry chains. About 75 persons enjoyed skiing and tobogganing yesterday at Union Creek where more than 75 inches of snow were reported today. Few ventured to Crater lake national park yesterday because of the closure of park roads.

"Graupel" Squall

Medford experienced a wintry squall at midday yesterday. What appeared to be sleet was whipped about by a lusty gust of wind, but the weather bureau described it as "graupel," or pebble snow, a mixture that meteorologists place in a category halfway between sleet and snow.

Maximum temperature yesterday was 45 degrees as compared with 52 Saturday and 63 Friday. The minimum yesterday was 37 as against 41 Saturday and 46 Friday. Today's forecast said there would be little change in temperatures.
