EXTRA, STANDARD BUTTER ADVANCES

PORTLAND, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Further advance of 1c for extra and 1/2c lb. for standard cube butter took effect in the local trade for the week's opening as a result of a holiday-season boost on the produce exchange. Butterfat was boosted to 1b.

Better prices were announced for eggs by some operators with up to 21c dozen offered for extras and 19c for standard with cases returned.

Condition of the cheese trade appeared a trifle erratic but prices were still on a nominal basis.

The acute shortage of light leghorn hens resulted in a new record high mark of 19c lb., which appeared out of line with 14c for medium hens and 17c for heavy weights.

Strong prices continued in the market for country killed meats, especially for veal. Sales of these were up to 15 1/2c lb. Hogs were steady around 15 to 15 1/2c lb. generally with lambs held 15 to 17c lb.

CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL ADS HIT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—An order to "cease and desist from the use of false and misleading advertising" in connection with the sale of correspondence course, was issued yesterday by the Federal trade commission against O. F. Schoeck, doing business as the O. F. Schoeck school, Alton, Ill.

The commission said the school operated extensively in Oregon, California and other western and southwestern states. He sold Diesel engineering courses and air-conditioning courses.

The commission declared it found Schoeck had advertised under the "help wanted" columns and, after contacting prospects, promised them jobs upon completion of courses. The commission's order prohibited Schoeck from representing "ordinary clerical and other subordinate employees" as executive officers such as "chief engineer."
