

TRAIL MAN SEEKS SEAT IN CONGRESS ON MONEY SYSTEM

James A. Coomes of Trail today announced he would be an independent candidate for representative in the U. S. congress.

Mr. Coomes said his bid for the office would be based primarily upon his own "currency control principle" by which he expects to stabilize prices and remove the vagaries of fluctuating money values.

He explained his principle embraces establishment of a dual system of money, one for international settlements, the other for domestic business, each independent of the other but connected by a variable ratio of exchange.

The present gold standard would be retained by Mr. Coomes for the international money system, while the domestic system would involve fiat currency. The money for home use would be issued directly by the government, the volume to be regulated in accordance with an established average price index.

If the price index rises, a retail tax would be imposed to bring it back in line, while if it dropped below its established level the government would put more money into circulation to bring it back to normal, Mr. Coomes related.

The first step in his plan, he said, is to retire all national, state, county and municipal debt with the new fiat money.

Mr. Coomes came to Trail with his family three years ago from Hampton, Iowa. He said he has had wide experience as an auditor.

LIFE FOR SLAYING EXPECTANT WIFE

ITHACA, Mich., Feb. 28.—(AP)—George Blank, 24-year old farmer who pleaded guilty to killing his young wife, an expectant mother, and burning her body, expressed no remorse today as he awaited removal to state prison for the rest of his "natural life."

The law moved swiftly yesterday after the former Sunday school superintendent confessed he became "mad enough to kill" when his wife, Bernice, "kept nagging about money" for the expected birth.

He chloroformed her as she screamed into the telephone, Blank related in a signed statement, then poured kerosene over her body and set it afire.

Forest Mills, former Willamette university student, was elected assistant librarian to replace Etta West-endorp who was granted a year's leave of absence to attend library school at the University of California.

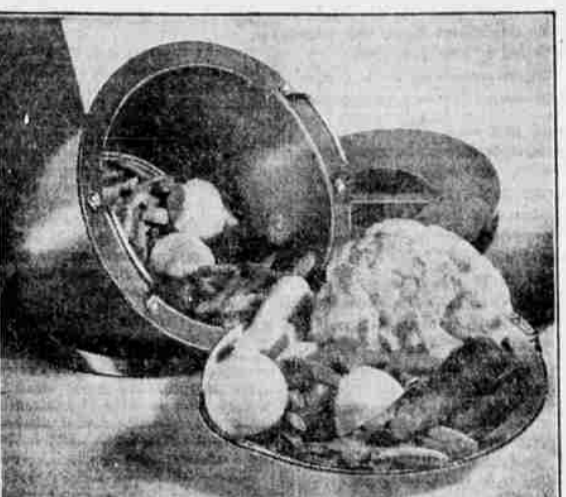
ALTON, Mo., Feb. 28.—(AP)—Avery Brown, 51, was sentenced to 30 days in jail here for beating another man over the head with a dog.

Everyday Cooking Miracles

AUTHORIZE SALARY FOR SECRETARY OF BUDGET DIVISION

SALEM, Feb. 28.—(AP)—After more than an hour's discussion the state emergency board today approved an appropriation of \$5500 for the budget department to pay the salary of the executive secretary and for deficiencies resulting from additional duties.

The request was made by Wallace S. Wharton, recently appointed executive secretary in charge of the budget division as set out under the act of the special session of the legislature. Wharton assumed his duties February 8.

While the emergency board expressed itself as falling to credit the salary reduction saving to the budget department, as set out in the brief, direct savings were declared reason enough for the additional appropriation.

In the request the budget division set out \$195,000 as indirect saving as a result of salary cuts. Other savings were not itemized. The appropriation was made with the statement that the board expected the department to appear before the next legislature, not only with a clear budget but with a showing of effecting a substantial direct saving in state activities. The legislature had appropriated \$15,750 for the division in the regular session.

D'Ichthal was president of the political science school and a member of the Academy of Moral and Political Sciences.

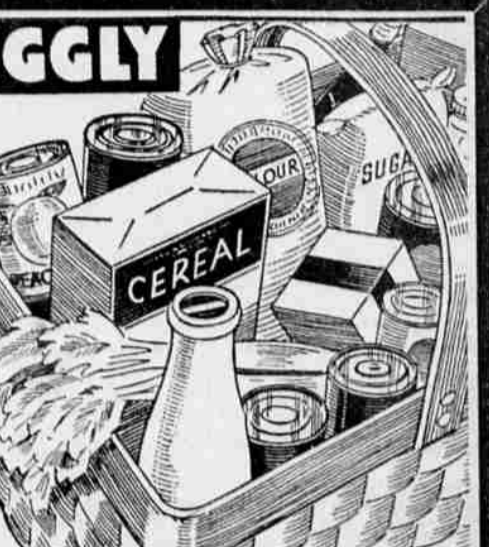
