S. P. NET INCOME
TAKES BIG LEAP

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—(AP) Southern Pacific Co. today reported net income of Southern Pacific lines in 1935 amounted to \$2,346,889, compared with \$408,225 in 1934, an increase of \$1,938,664, or 474.83 per cent. For Southern Pacific lines and all separately operated, controlled and affiliated companies, there was a consolidated net loss of \$1,744,551, compared with a net loss of \$3,907,604 in 1934. Net railway operating income of Southern Pacific lines amounting to \$20,319,870, was larger than for any year since 1931, and compared with \$17,003,657 in 1934. "Business generally," the report of Hale Holden, chairman of the board, stated, "appeared to be upon a sounder basis than at any time since the beginning of the depression period. Freight traffic improved progressively throughout the year, and for the last quarter the revenues were larger than for the same period of any year since 1930."

Border patrol inspectors of the San Antonio, Texas, district made 360 arrests, seized 74 automobiles and 31 boats with contraband, took 357 animals and 3,884 quarts of liquor after illegal crossings in 1935.

Brazilian government receipts in the federal district of Rio de Janeiro, the ports of Santos and Rio de Janeiro and the industrial center of Sao Paulo for the first 10 months of 1935 totaled \$7,600,000 more than in the same period in 1934.

Record of 178 farmers studied in the department of farm economics at the Kentucky college of agriculture show an average increase in net earnings of \$946, or 54 per cent per farm in 1934 over 1933.
