

SNOWMEN TO BID FOR SKI HONORS AT CRATER LAKE

Plans for a three-club competitive ski tournament at Crater Lake national park will be discussed at a meeting of the Rogue Snowmen in the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce at 7:30 next Friday night, March 6.

The Snow Clan of Klamath Falls and the Crater Lake Ski club of Fort Klamath have set Saturday, March 22, as the tentative date of the meet. Sam Jennings, Rogue Snowmen president, has written the two clubs for detailed information and he expects to have definite facts to place before the local club next Friday. It is considered likely that the Sky Liners of Bend also will join the tournament.

There will be no regular meeting of Rogue Snowmen tonight, Mr. Jennings said, but members will go to Crater Lake Sunday for a day of practice. J. Carlisle Crouch, chief ranger and acting superintendent, who spent the past two days at Crater Lake, announced this morning that tentative plans have been adopted for free ski lessons at the mountain resort each Sunday beginning March 8.

Cecil Morris, Klamath Falls ace, and L. Howard Crawford, experienced ski artist of the lake winter crew, will give the lessons, Mr. Crouch said. Everyone is invited to take advantage of the free lessons, from those who find it difficult to stand on a pair of skis to those who require expert coaching on difficult turns. Mr. Crouch stated.

Mr. Crouch said the park is now at its height in regal winter beauty. The lake, he related, is a deep blue picture in a frame of snowy white. He urged residents to take the trip to the park just to witness the wintry splendor.

Mr. Crouch returned from the lake by car last night, coming over the west entrance highway, which he said was in good condition for safe travel. Snow in the park was about 15 feet deep, he stated.

BT. FALLS VICTOR IN SERIES OPENER

The Butte Falls high school basketball team gained a thin finger hold on the county title last night on their own floor when they edged the Phoenix high school lads out, 25-23, in the first of a three game series. The lead changed hands five times during the fray, with never more than two points separating the two teams. Phoenix led at half time, 10-8, but lost that advantage shortly after half time.

The two teams meet again tomorrow night at Phoenix, the game to start at 7:30. In case of a Phoenix win, the county title would be tied, and a play-off game arranged for this city next week, probably on Tuesday on the Junior high floor. A Butte Falls win will give them two straight and the county title.

Five of the officers were selected as having blood of the type required to match hers.

She was rushed here by boat and train for treatment at the Shrine hospital for crippled children after her leg skate wound injury developed infection and failed to respond to two operations.

Two blood transfusions probably will be given to build up her condition, which Miss Letha Humphrey, hospital superintendent, described as anemic.

in the law to make it conform with federal statutes. The federal law requires pension recipients to have lived in the state seven of the 10 years preceding application, and one year continuously immediately preceding application.

The committee set aside \$20,000 for medical care of crippled children. The University of Oregon medical school will administer this social security work.

In a hot reply to statements by the budget director, Committee Member E. R. Bryson said: "I don't like the budget director's saying he had investigated (relief administration expenses) when he didn't."

"I don't like his statement that he had directed us to make further reductions, when he didn't. And I don't like his statement that we made only a 40 per cent reduction in costs, when we'd cut expenses 63 per cent."

County relief administration expenses also were cut more than 40 per cent he said.

LINFIELD FACULTY TO GET PENSIONS

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Feb. 28.—(AP)—A pension plan for Linfield college staff members will go into effect at once, President Elam J. Anderson announced today.

Employees will contribute five per cent of their monthly salaries and the college will add another two per cent. The pension was worked out with an insurance company. Men staff members will retire at the age of 65, and women at the age of 60. Provision is made for pensions at earlier ages under special circumstances.

Straight pension, or combination pension and insurance policies are available. The pension plan will be available to those who have been with the college three years or more. Faculty members leaving Linfield will retain their pension accumulations.

SKI STARS GATHER FOR HOOD TOURNEY

GOVERNMENT CAMP, Ore., Feb. 28.—(AP)—An eager band of skyline speed demons gathered here today for the Pacific northwest slalom and downhill ski tournament on the snow-packed steeps of Mt. Hood Saturday and Sunday.

More than 65 contestants were signed up today for the breakneck competition.

The spectacular downhill races will start tomorrow at 1 p. m. The difficult slalom course will be the test Sunday, starting at 10 a. m.

USED AUTO TIRES SUPPLY MATERIAL IN NEW INDUSTRY

A new industry is in the making for southern Oregon. J. A. Youngs, of Ashland, is just completing machines for the manufacture of floor mats and runners for which he uses as raw material used automobile tires.

The mats are said by Youngs to be superior to the usual type, in that they are loosely woven, so that dirt will sift through to the floor, rather than becoming imbedded in the mat; that they will wear for from eight to ten years; and that his product is springy and resilient, making it a boon to those whose work makes standing or walking all day necessary.

Youngs' machines are home-manufactured and electrically operated, one set employing seven persons. Weaving is done by hand, but all other work connected with the manufacture is machine operated.

The principle feature of the enterprise, according to Youngs, is that old tires which are now discarded can be converted into useful articles. He plans to operate on a small scale scale from now until next fall, when he will establish a permanent and enlarged plant in Medford, which he feels to be the most prominent business center in southern Oregon, he said.

Youngs has been a resident of the Rogue River valley for the past twelve years, having resided in Medford and Ashland and other valley points.
